

# FOG AT PARIS **DELAYS FLIERS**

British Aviators Complete First Stage of 30,000-Mile Flight.

Await Favorable Weather **Conditions Before Start**ing On Second Leg.

Paris May 25.-Because of a slight og this forenoon there was some delay in the departure of Major W T. Blake, Capt. Norman MacMillan and Lieut.-Col. L. E. Brome, the British aviators, who reached Paris vesterday from England, on the first tage of their attempted 30,000-mile flight around the world. The airmen had their machine out on Bourge Field ready for departure, but at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon they were still awaiting more favorable conditions.

The next stop for the world-touring aviators will be Lyons. Their presence here synchronizes with the first of a four-day international exhibition in which many noted aviators are participating.

BEGIN WORLD FLIGHT. CROYDON, England, May 24.— Major W. T. Blake and his companions started from the airdrome here at 3:05 o'clock this afternoon on their attempted 30,000-mile airplane flight around the world.

The three aviators, Major Blake, Capt. Norman MacMillan and Lieut. col. L. E. Broome made their start in the D.H. 9 airplane equipped for their trip, without the attendant plane with photographers and moving picture operators, which, it had been planned to send with them as far as Athens, as it was found impossible to get the second machine eady on time.
