THE FISHERY DECISIONS.

The judgment of the Supreme Court as to the rights of the Dominion and the Provinces respectively in the fisheries, sea coast and inland, has been well described as "involved." The case was submitted to the Court in the form of a number of questions. The Court answered these questions briefly and concisely, but before either questions or answers can be thoroughly understood the inquirer must have a knowledge not only of the legislation of the Dominion with respect to the fisheries but of the legislation of the Province of Ontario on the comprehension of the judgment.


