

THE LIVERPOOL ARRESTS

WHAT THE EXPLOSION HAD IN VIEW

Arrangement of the New Taken at Cork-A Letter From Mr. O'Brien, M.P. Found on One of the Prisoners.

Liverpool, March 30.—It is believed that the arrests here and at St. Helena yesterday were not an accident, but were planned and executed in accordance with a scheme to prevent the explosion of the Grand Trunk from being successful.

An analysis of the chemicals and explosives seized here yesterday develops the fact that they are composed of nitro-glycerine, mixed with sawdust, chlorite, potash and virgite. It was almost a miracle the composition did not explode during the transmission through the streets.

Featherston, O'Hertley and Carmody were a grand jury this morning for being members of a secret society having its headquarters in the city of Liverpool.

The prisoner O'Hertley had a letter purporting to come from Mr. O'Brien, M.P., and the editor of the United Irish.

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FK. BYRNE IN NEW YORK.

AN INTERVIEW WITH ONE OF GARDNER'S VIOLINISTS.

His Story of the Arrest in Syracuse—A Brief Sketch of His History—Reminiscences of the Musical World.

New York, March 30.—Frank Byrne, who was arrested in Paris on the demand of the British government and whose extradition was refused, is now in this city, having arrived with his wife in the America from Havre on Wednesday last.

He is tall and well-formed, apparently weighing in the neighborhood of 170 pounds, and about 40 years of age.

On being interrogated Mr. Byrne stated that he was born in county Dublin, Ireland, and at an early age was apprenticed in a grocery store.

At the conclusion of the Franco-Prussian war Mr. Byrne returned to Ireland and engaged in peaceful pursuits.

Mr. Byrne then related the circumstances of his arrest and detention in Paris, saying that he had been one of the first violins of the orchestra of the opera house.

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
