RESULT OF AN OPEN SWITCH

Conviction of a Bigamist Sustained.

An important decision was rendered yesterday at Osgoode Hall in the Chancery Divisional Court by Chancellor Boyd and Mr. Justice Ferguson, in which Mr. Justice Robertson concurred.

Queen v. Brierly, the prisoner being charged with bigamy, and coming before the court from the Middlesex quarter sessions. The second marriage took place in Michigan, and two points were put forth in the prisoner's defence: First, That the enactment of the Dominton Parliament under which the indictment was laid—C.S.C. ch. 161, sec. 4—was ultra vives; secondly, That the evidence of the foreign marriage was not sufficient.
