CAMPERS GUILTY OF KILLING THE FOREST
Apropos of the wholesale destruction of forest areas already this year by careless campers and other users of the woods, the Canadian Forestry Association puts this query to every Canadian lover of outdoors: Horses couldn't drag you to a hunting trip in a treeless wilderness; a fishing trip by a treeless stream; or camping out in a treeless valley.

Isn't it about time that the call of the outdoors is the call of trees? The hospitality of nature means little to any man except when associated with living trees.

Last summer hundreds of parties of campers struck an unfair blow at the rights and privileges of fellow campers, fellow sportsmen and nature lovers by starting at least 2,500 damaging forest fires.

Camp fires that were not put out, matches and smokes thoughtlessly thrown on the inflammable "floor" of the woods—these personal acts killed the camping, fishing and hunting in many thousands of square miles of Canadian forest.

Don't be a Kill-joy. The forest is made for the fellow who follows after you.

Enjoy the woods! There's nothing to fear except fire. And might: few fires except what you start.

Remember: all big fires start as little ones. One minute's care may save a century of waiting.

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NOTES OF OUR EARLY HISTORY

(Continued from Page Three)

Thus the second night was spent for their missing comrades war had been captured by the stray French Acadians the previous day.

In the morning further effort was made to cross the river but although they went as far up as Paradise and beyond every where they found the river current too swift and deep to admit of their reaching the other bank. They, however, saw some horses and heard random signal shots fired by the enemy.

They at last decided the only thing to do was to return to Annapolis the way they had come and by noon on the 8th inst they reached the vicinity of Bloody Creek, then called Foret River. The bridge over this stream at this time was located half way between the present highway bridge and the old mill dam and the road led up the steep embankment on the west side of the Creek.

As the advance soldiers were crossing the narrow bridge, which consisted of two logs side by side, they were suddenly fired on from the high bank ahead of them with a dreadful fire of ball and buck shot seconded by a horrid yell. The commanding officer, Capt. Peter Pigou, a sergeant, and twenty-two men of the rank, were instantly killed, while the rest fell back hurriedly in the open space in the hollow.

Recovering order and with the next officer in command it was decided they must take the hill from where the deadly musket fire had come at all hazards. This they did with some further loss. The enemy making away into the thick woods on every side and no further trouble occurred in their return to Annapolis.

The men who were surprised and taken prisoners on the 6th inst at Granville Ferry were taken to Petford, N. B., and from there to Miramichi and the following year escaped and were able to supply to some extent further details of this disaster. The prisoners reported that a Frenchman had climbed a tree in Granville and had seen the British soldiers pass up and had given their signals for a rally to cut them off. Hiding their prisoners in a small hut in the woods on the north bank of the river opposite the mouth of Bloody Creek, about fifty of them crossed the river and took their position where they made their attack as the detachment of soldiers as they were filing over the fatal trap bridge. The French lost in this engagement seven men.

Mr. Eason and his companions were kept at Miramichi until the next spring being fed on "salt fish and tallow". After their escape Mr. Eason went to Quebec and helped at the capture of that fortress in 1759. He then returned to his family at Lequille and was the brave and distinguished progenitor of the Eason family of this county. A grandson, Alexander Eason, lived at Bridge-town and his son, Mr. Chas. H. Eason, General Manager of Standard Bank of Canada, Toronto, a Bridge-town boy that has made good, comes of the same heroic stock.

This disaster at Bloody Creek seems to have escaped the notice of all our historians either of Annapolis County or of the Province.

The first New England settlers came here less than three years after it occurred and were familiar with the bloody tale and they told the story to their children most graphically, how the creek ran blood. As the soldiers tell into their swift flowing stream fatally wounded but in the long years since those distressing eventful days on the river, the particulars were wanting, as told as by our grandparents and they are only possible now through the regaling quite recently by the Champlain Society of Canada, of Knox's Journal.


Lieut. Knox was an officer of this 43rd regiment and while at Annapolis with his regiment kept a diary. From here he went to Quebec where he participated in the siege and capture of that fortress in 1759 and where he also kept a journal. On his return to England his Journal was published about 1765 and the edition being very limited it is very rare at the end of one hundred and fifty years.

Lieut. Knox says in his preface that his object in publishing his journal was for the sake of a record, and he asks the readers of his day this pertinent question: "Though the facts here recited are known now, how long will that knowledge continue if they are trusted merely to memory?"

We have seen how true this is regarding the story of the Bloody Creek disaster. Both the date and circumstance and details of it had been obliterated save a very dim tradition and it was never recorded in our own Nova Scotia or county histories.

No doubt the more important events such as the capture of Louisbourg the following year, and the siege of Quebec the next with the close of the French Colonies in the North American continent over shadowed these minor tragedies in this vicinity and thus escaped the attention of early writers. The intention of our celebration committee to reproduce this Bloody Creek battle scene and to mark its location and to hold at that


