Western United Baptist Association

The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Western United Baptist Association opened on Thursday evening, June 15th, with the Middleton church. This association includes the counties of Lunenburg, Digby and Annapolis.

Temperance was the subject on Thursday evening. The report on temperance was submitted by Rev. B. D. Knott, of Mahone Bay. Strong addresses were made by Rev. P. C. Reid, of Bridgewater, and Rev. H. R. Grant, Secretary of the Nova Scotia Temperance Alliance.

At the Friday morning session officers were chosen as follows:— Moderator—Rev. M. W. Brown, Lower Granville. Vice-Moderator—Rev. P. C. Reid, Bridgewater. Secretary—Rev. H. B. Smith, Melville Square. Assistant Secretary—Rev. B. D. Knott, Mahone Bay. Treasurer—G. F. Freeman, Middleton.

The digest of letters from the churches showed 135 baptisms during the year and was generally encouraging. A hearty welcome was extended by the moderator to new pastors: Rev. S. S. Poole, Rev. C. Rishborough, Rev. I. D. Nowlan and Rev. W. E. Carpenter.

The report on obituaries referred to Revs. F. M. Young, John Williams, P. R. Foster, W. H. Warren, Deacons Russell Denton, W. Lent, A. W. Mason Austin Smith, Solomon Zwicker, Frank Smith, Henry Goucher; Dr. Freeman Bill; Mrs. O. P. Young and Mrs. Stephen March.

A resolution of sympathy with Rev. C. H. Haverscock in his illness was passed.

The report upon Systematic Beneficence was presented by Rev. C. S. McLean.

The scheme for raising an endowment of \$65,000 for the Minister's Annuity Fund was explained by Rev. Edwin Crowell, D.D.

The Saturday afternoon session devoted to Missions was in charge of the women. Mrs. J. L. Hinds, of Port George, presided.

Reports from the Woman's Missionary Societies in Lunenburg were presented by Mrs. F. W. Verga and for Annapolis Co. by Mrs. Hinds.

Mrs. C. S. McLean read a paper upon "The Children's Place in Missions" and Mrs. M. M. Mack gave the report upon "Baby Bands."

Miss Flora Clark and Rev. C. S. Freeman, returned missionaries, addressed the Association.

At the session on Saturday evening a resolution was passed condemning the "no tamera" decree and demanding one uniform law for the whole Dominion.

On the question of Temperance the work of Rev. H. R. Grant was commended and the proposal for one uniform prohibitory law for the whole province including Halifax was endorsed.

Resolutions expressing thanks to the people of Middleton and others who had contributed to the success of the gathering were passed.

Miss Hortense Spurr gave an interesting address upon the Feller Institute near Montreal and Rev. H. G. Mellick very clearly presented the work of the Canadian West.

The associational sermon was preached on Sunday morning by Rev. H. B. Smith. His text was from Paul's words, "We preach Christ crucified" and the sermon was an argumentative and scholarly one.

Rev. C. Rishborough, of Lunenburg, and Rev. G. P. Raymond, of Annapolis Royal, gave strong addresses on Sunday afternoon dealing with the importance of Sunday School work.

The closing session on Sunday evening was devoted to foreign missions—Outlook.

The friendship of thirty or forty years ever strong were strengthened by the exchange of greetings as the company sat down to table and in the evening young friends arrived to complete the happiness of their motherly friend. Dancing was enjoyed and Mrs. Fairweather showed that she had not forgotten the graceful steps of her younger days. Before dispersing the party left a large number of useful and pretty gifts as a remembrance.

Mrs. Fairweather was born in Carleton in the year 1824. She was the third daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm.

Two Were Killed and Five Injured in Auto Accident

Car Skidded on a Sandy Road, One Wheel Broke off and Machine Turned a Somersault.

Toronto, June 19—Two persons killed and five injured was the result of an automobile accident at Hawkeston, near Orilla, on Saturday evening. The dead are:—

Miss Marie Thompson. Henry C. Martin, of Swansea. Charles Bowden, of 103 Major St. Mrs. George T. Thompson, clerk for the Toronto Electric Light Company.

The accident occurred on a steep hill near Hawkeston. Braidwood was driving and Miss Crawford was sitting with him in front. The road was heavy with sand, and the car almost came to a stop. Braidwood put on extra speed, and the clutch, which was working stiffly, jerked the car forward with such momentum that it skidded around and broke off the left front wheel. The car turned a half somersault into the ditch. Braidwood and Miss Crawford being fatally crushed under the engine and throwing the other occupants some distance.

Under Rule of Five Sovereigns. Mrs. Fairweather is a warm admirer of the reigning house of Brunswick, and has had the pleasure of living under the rule of five of them. She is especially reminiscent when the name of Edward Seventh is mentioned, as she remembers seeing him as a young prince, when he visited Canada. He was escorted through the city by the fire companies and, passing under the arch erected in King street in his honor, he would have been pleased to leave his carriage and enjoy himself with the youngsters on the green. The princely dignity was maintained by the interference of the royal officers.

The most remarkable feature in Mrs. Fairweather's life is her participation for seventy-four years in the musical service of St. George's church. She was in the choir when thirteen years of age, and until very recently has occupied her position. In her younger days it was her custom to appear in musical recitals, and only seven years ago she sang a solo in St. Luke's church. Her voice has been unusually sweet.

The charm of attaining so happily such length of life according to the philosophy of the aged lady is summed up in the word "activity." Don't said she, "sit down in a corner and brood over things. Stimulate a good ambition, and keep in motion. Some old people take no interest in what's about, but spend their time in sleeping. But as long as I have feet I am going to use them and the same with my eyes. I have always had a good appetite and enjoy the good things to eat. Fruit has been my favorite. Tired of life? No! I've been going in for a good time, and I enjoy life more than ever. I like to keep a joke going and make the home happy and when I am gone they will miss me. I may not be long here, but I believe in life for the living. There is a time for prayer, but true religion is not melancholy."
