Some of the things, then, which Saskatchewan desires to share with the new comer are her wonderfully fertile lands, her health-giving climate, excellent transportation facilities and marketing service, her educational system, and the means provided by church and state for the betterment of society. She offers one thing more, of which the conditions I have attempted do describe are but the natural fruits—citizentship under the folds of the Union Jack. What this means we realize more fully to-day than any of us possibly could have done before we saw the might of Britain's manhood and resources thrown into the balance of human freedom. This, our greatest heritage, the new comer shares with the native born.
