

## Toronto Wholesale Trade.

Toronto, Nov. 21.  
Dry Goods—Better demand for heavy goods owing to cold weather with snow. Jobbers whose supplies of early cottons are exhausted are asking more, especially on lower grades, owing to mills advancing prices since their own buyers are slow.

Hardware—Good demand for winter tools. Metals are selling well and prices are mostly firm.  
Groceries—Fairly active, especially holiday goods. Teas and dried fruits are firm. Sugars firm at recent advance.

## Toronto Grain and Produce.

Toronto, Nov. 21.  
Winter wheat is steady at 62c. Manitoba 1 hard is 1/2c dearer. Flour is steady and unchanged. Oats are easier at 1/2c decline. Butter receipts are large, but choice goods are in light supply at unchanged prices. Strictly fresh gathered eggs are in fair supply and firm.

Wheat—40c for firm, red and white—middle freights; spring wheat, 47c. Canada, Manitoba wheat is worth 10c to 12c for No. 1, 12c to 14c for No. 2 northern, and 12c to 14c for No. 2 northern, grading in transit.

Oats—No. 2 white, Ontario, 31 to 31 1/2c east.

Barley—No. 3 extra is quoted at 45c and No. 3 at 42c east, or middle freights.

Flour—50 per cent. Ontario patents, \$2.75, in buyers' hands; middle grades (Choice brands) are held 15 to 20c higher. Manitoba flour is steady at \$4.10 for 100 lbs. Hungarian patents, and \$3.90 for Glenora, in car lots, bags included, on track, Toronto.

Milled—Shoe \$17 per ton and bran \$14.50 per ton, middle freights.

Manitoba feed, \$20 for cars of shorts and 41c for barrel sacks included, and \$1.90 for Glenora, in car lots, bags included, on track, Toronto.

Oatmeal—\$4.00 for cars of bags, and \$4.10 in bulk for carlots, Toronto.

Hay—Carlots for No. 1, \$3.50 to \$3.75 per ton for No. 1 Timothy.

Eggs—Case lots, new laid, 19 to 20c per dozen, second quality 15c.

Butter—Dairy, pound rolls 17 to 18c; tubs and pails, 16 to 17c; medium, 14 to 15c; creamed, 12 to 13c; 100s, 10c to 11c; prints, 21 to 21 1/2c.

Hides—12c to 13c for job lots. No. 1 steers, 8c; calves, 10c for No. 1 and 8c for No. 2; lambskins, 65c each; tallow, 6c to 6 1/2c.

Wool—Washed fleece, 14c; unwashed, 12c.

Beans—\$2 to \$2.25 per bushel for job lots of hand picked, and \$1.75 to \$1.90 for unpicked.

Apples—Evaporated, 6c to 7c; dried 4 1/2c.

Maple Syrup—\$1 per imperial gallon, in bulk or 50 lb. tins.

Honey—8 to 8 1/2c per gallon in bulk; in frames, \$1.50 to \$1.75.

Poultry—Spring chickens, dressed, 50 to 70c per pair; ducks, 60c to 80c; turkeys, 10 to 11 1/2c for young birds.

Potatoes—Cans 10c per bag.

## Montreal Live Stock.

At the East End abattoir on Monday receipts were 100 cattle and 1,200 sheep and lambs.

The butchers were out in large numbers and there was a fair demand for anything good. A few of the best steers sold at from 3 1/2c to 4c, good animals at from 3 1/4c to 4c, and common stock at from 2c to 3c per lb. The canners put from 1 1/2c to 2c per lb. for their supplies. The calves sold at from 3c to 3 1/2c per lb. Sheep brought from 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c and lambs from 2 1/2c to a little over 4c per lb. Fat hogs sold at from 5 1/2c to 6c per lb. weighed off the cars.

## THURSDAY'S MARKETS.

At the East End abattoir on Thursday receipts were cattle and sheep and lambs.

Best butchers' cattle sold at 4c, but the quality of the animals only middling. Really choice animals would bring 4 1/2c to 4 3/4c. Common sold at 2c to 3 1/2c. Yearlings, 3 1/2c to 4c, and 3c per lb. Sheep, 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c. Lambs, 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c. Good fat hogs, 5 1/2c to 6c.

## Toronto Live Stock Market.

Toronto, Nov. 21.  
Receipts at the middle market yesterday included 84 loads, 1,224 cattle, 1,042 sheep and lambs, and 1,024 hogs.

Export cattle—Most of the cattle here comes from buyers who have space.

Prices are higher at \$4.75 to \$5.25 per cwt., and occasionally a fine animal will bring over \$5.00. Medium grades in mixed and light weights are steadier at \$4.25 to \$4.75, and export cattle are at \$5.00 to \$5.25.

Butchers' cattle—Offerings are not up to the mark in quality. Prices of firsts are unchanged. Choice steers picked, \$4 to \$4.50; good, \$3.70 to \$4.00; medium, \$3.25 to \$3.70.

Choice lambs—There was a moderately large run, and trade was in good shape. Export ewes sold 10 to 12c, and stockers and feeders, 8c to 10c. Lambs 10c per cwt. higher at \$3.50 to 4c. Bucks were nominally steady at \$2.50 to \$2.75 per cwt., but buyers say that they do not want them at any price.

Choice hogs—The market is steady, with prices unchanged at \$6.12 1/2 per cwt. for select, 60c for run of cars, and \$5.87 1/2 for light.

Bidding for choice exporters was spirited, and prices held steady at 47 1/2 to \$5.50. Butchers' choice sold readily at 44 1/2 to \$5.12 1/2 per cwt. Poor grades sold 42 1/2 to \$4.75.
