UNION FUNDS LIABLE.

Judge Anglin has reversed the order of the master-in-chambers in the action against Local Union No. 30 of the Amalgamated Sheet Metal Workers.

The result of the judgment is that the money in the Dominion Bank to the credit of the union may be attached to pay the \$146 costs ordered by the court of appeal. The plaintiffs are the Metal Workers. The master-in-chambers had held that the union was not liable for the costs of the action, but Judge Anglin has reversed this decision.

TORONTO CONDUCTOR HURT.

Michael Corrigan struck by engine at Belleville.

Belleville, May 30.—Michael Corrigan, a G. T. R. conductor, whose home is in Toronto, was this afternoon struck by an engine at the station here and badly injured.

He was taken to the hospital and found to be badly injured internally besides having his shoulder-blade broken. It is expected he will recover.

George Gorman, another G. T. R. employee, was struck by the same engine and escaped with slight injuries.

ASTRONOMICAL SOCIETY.

At a meeting of the Royal Astronomical Society in the Canadian Institute last night, Director Stearns of the observatory, discussing the latest of weather changes, stated that in his opinion the cause of such changes in the winter seasons of the year is still an enigma, though he felt sure that before long the meteorologist could be able to predict the weather for a longer period ahead than can now be accurately done.

Dr. Chand gave an account of his trip to a number of astronomical observatories in the United States, which he had gone to investigate and gain information as to equipment and requirements for the teaching of astronomy. Among the observatories visited were the Dudley observatory, Albany, N. Y.; Amesbury observatory, Massachusetts; Harvard College observatory, Cambridge, Mass.; Columbia College observatory, New York; Princeton University observatory, New Jersey; Mt. Wilson observatory, California; and the Lick observatory, California.

The Dudley observatory, Albany, N. Y., is the only one in the United States which has a complete set of instruments for the teaching of astronomy.

TILL FITZPATRICK RETURNS

Mr. Borden Asks for a Chance to Reply to "Explanation." But Must Wait.

He would not discuss it until Mr. Fitzpatrick had returned.
