Asphalt To Be Repaired By Warrens This Year

Board of Works Goes Back on Day Labor Scheme—Walks To Be Torn Up.

The board of works last night decided to allow the Warren Paving Company to make the repairs to the asphalt pavements this year, instead of attempting to do the work by day labor.

A letter from City Solicitor Meredith was read, which stated that, despite the fact that the Warren Company has a contract to make the repairs this year, the city could, if it was deemed wise, make the repairs itself by day labor.

The committee took the ground, however, that labor being very scarce and dear, it was altogether likely that day labor would cost more than the contract work of the Warrens.

It was also stated that the city would have to buy its asphalt from one of the companies and would have to arrange for the use of a plant to heat the material.

On the whole, it was not deemed advisable to do the work by day labor.

Bad for the Repairs.

City Engineer Graydon asked for the sum of \$3,500 to make the repairs this year, but the item was reduced to \$2,500 when the estimates were agreed upon.

Consequently, there is not sufficient money to repair the pavements this year.

Engineer Graydon proposed to the committee that the money be used as far as it will go on Dundas street, from Richmond to Wellington, and on Richmond street, from Dundas to the Grand Trunk. The suggestion was adopted.

The Warren Company is expected here shortly to commence work on the pavement between the Grand Trunk and Horton street on Richmond, and the work of repairing the pavements will then be proceeded with.

Will Tear Up Walks.

Engineer Graydon was instructed to have the ward foremen pull up at once a number of board sidewalks which are declared to be dangerous and may result in suits for damages being lodged against the city. Some of the walks are as follows: West side of Wellington street, Simcoe to Grey; west side Wellington street, Ottawa way avenue to this bridge; north side of the Hamilton road, Hill street to Rectory.

It is also likely that the board on Adelaide street, west side, Bathurst to the Hamilton road, will also be taken up. It was on this walk that Mrs. Charles Depper, of the Hamilton road, tripped and fell, breaking her limb. At the board of works last night it was stated that she has already commenced an action against the city.

Want Drainage.

A deputation was presented from the vicinity of Eva street in East London to press a request for drainage for that section. It was stated by Chairman Matthews that the drainage from the township and especially from the asylum, flows onto the land and floods the cellars there. Consequently he thought the matter should be laid before Hon. Adam Beck, with a view to having the Ontario Government pay a part of the cost of providing drainage.

One of the residents knocked this scheme, however, by declaring that the land is wet at all times of the year through lack of drainage, it being low land.

It appears that in the past the city and country attempted to put down a drain there, but they disagreed as to the proportion of cost which should be paid. The city had offered to pay 50 per cent of the cost, but the country would not agree to pay the other 50 per cent.

Blamed County Engineer.

Councillors Glass and Kimball were present. Mr. Glass declared that the township would never consent to pay the 50 per cent asked.

Engineer Graydon blamed the county engineer for ordering work done some time ago which had resulted in the natural outlet for the water being done away with.

At a meeting of the town council on Monday evening, the clerk, J. B. Martyn, informed the council that he had received a communication from Hon. Adam Beck, saying he had placed the matter of the water power at the Bend, Longwoods road, before the department, with the result that the Hydro-Electric Commissioners' engineer will give it his earliest attention.

Finally, after the matter had been discussed for nearly an hour, Messrs. Glass and Kimball stated that the township would be willing to pay the 50 per cent if the city would pay the other 50 per cent of the cost of the new sewer, but the township is to be allowed for half the cost of the tile now in the ground. In other words the city will allow the township 24 cents a foot for the 275 feet of tile mentioned.

Against Opening Street.

City Engineer Graydon reported against the opening of Eva street. He pointed out that the council has passed a resolution against the purchasing of lots, or parts of lots, to open up streets, and that as a consequence the city has no power unless the resolution is rescinded to do anything to open up the street.

Mr. Graydon stated that if the property-owners interested desire the street opened, they should buy the necessary land, as they were aware when they bought property in the district that Eva street was not opened through.

The grant made by the council for making and maintaining the streets already in existence is insufficient for the purpose," said Mr. Graydon. "Therefore, to spend a single dollar to open up new streets would be a reckless waste of money."

It was decided to have the city engineer make a report as to a certain piece of land which, it is said, does not pay any taxes, and which may be utilized as an outlet for Eva street.

A New Street.

Mr. J. W. McLaren asked the committee for permission to open up a 40-foot street off Beaconsfield avenue and running south parallel to the Wortley road. He is opening up a new survey there, and he offered to pay all the cost of grading the proposed street.

The committee refused to consider the proposition, because of the width of the proposed street. Nothing less than 50 feet would be considered.

Mr. McLaren then agreed to remodel his plans and present them to the committee at its next meeting.

Mr. McLaren also requested that something be done toward the cutting down of the hill on Paul street, West London. The matter will be considered.

Dogs in Park.

Parks Commissioner Pearce complained of dogs in the park, especially of the depredations of a dog owned by a gentleman named Tanner.

Mr. Pearce stated that the canine is as big as a pony, that he steals bones and buries them in the flower-beds until they become toothsome, when he digs them up, and ruins the beds.

Secretary Bell was instructed to notify Mr. Tanner that he will be assessed for all damages caused by the dog.

On the recommendation of Mr. Pearce the city decided to call for tenders for the rewalling with cement of the lily pond in Victoria Park.

Queen's Park Matters.

The East London Bowling Club was given the use of a piece of ground, south of the poultry shed, on the fair grounds, so far as the committee has the power.

The construction of the cinder path in Queen's Park for the convenience of the G. T. R. car shops men was left to Parks Commissioner Pearce and Engineer Graydon. The G. T. R. is willing to supply free of charge eight carloads of cinders for the path.

The property-owners of Queen's avenue, south side, between Midland and William, asked that the sidewalk there be taken up and a new walk eight feet wide laid.

City Engineer Graydon reported that the city has no power to do the work unless the property-owners pay up in cash all installments due the city on the sidewalk, and that the people were not willing to do this. The matter was laid over for a week.

On the recommendation of Engineer Graydon it was decided to initiate a tile sewer on Lorne avenue, Quebec street to the easterly limit of Lorne avenue.
