ARCHBISHOP OF LEBANON ON VISIT TO KITCHENER
Welcomed by Local Syrians and Clergy of R. C. Church.

KITCHENER, Sept. 3.—Most Rev. Archbishop Kouri of Lebanon, whose Episcopal see is at Ba Sur, arrived in this city today on an official visit to the Syrian people of Kitchener as representative of the Patriarch of Lebanon. He was received by Rev. Father Theo. Spetz, representing the Roman Catholic clergy of this city, and Father Anthony of the Syrian congregation. A special delegation of prominent Syrians of the city also met him at the station. He was taken to St. Mary's Church, where an official reception was tendered in his honor. Archbishop Kouri represented the people of Lebanon at the peace conference in connection with the request for the right of home rule.

Mayor Eden announced today that a general committee on the assessments of properties throughout the city had been made in order to meet the increased expenditures for public purposes which will fall upon the corporation and which must be financed next year. He stated that the increase which amounts to between 15 and 20 per cent was made in order to guard against an excessive tax rate next year.

It was learned today that Arthur T. Walker, who has become the heir to \$50,000 left by Edward F. Sears of Methuen, Mass., whose private secretary he was, is a brother to Mrs. L. McElrath of Kitchener. Mr. Walker is well known here.

MUSTAFA KEMAL LOSES HOPE OF AID FROM BOLSHIEVIKI

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 3.—Mustafa Kemal Pasha, leader of the Turkish Nationalist forces, is reported to be feeling that his efforts to hold out until the November rains block the roads and give him a respite during the winter are becoming impossible. He is said to have lost hope of receiving immediate Bolshievik aid and lacks material with which to fight the Greeks his troops being depleted. It is anticipated that he will flee rather than surrender.

At the same time it is forecast the new cabinet to be named here will lean toward the Nationalists, so that the Sultan's government may be accepted throughout Turkey. Overtures to the Nationalists are going on to this end.

"Best Thing in New York Is a Ticket For Montreal"

OTTAWA, Sept. 3.—Hon. Henry B. E. McFarland of Washington, D. C., for ten years head of the commission that governs the district of Columbia, the United States federal district, and one of the great American. If not the great world orators, moved the members of the Canadian Bar Association near to both laughter and tears in a lofty and glittering address delivered today in the Chateau Laurier.

His theme was "Government of Laws—Not Men," and he developed his subject as only a great orator can.

GOVERNMENT COMMISSION PROTECTING SPECULATORS FROM LOSSES IN CANADA
Democratic Candidate in Whirlwind Rush Into Michigan From Rear of Car Platform Repeats Charge of Republican Plot "To Buy Presidency."

OTTAWA, Sept. 3.—The American department of justice has declined to come to the assistance of the sugar speculators of the United States, who are faced with heavy losses because of the recent slump in sugar prices. In Canada, however, the speculators are more fortunate. Here the Board of Commerce is following a theory laid down by it probably in anticipation of such a situation some time ago, namely, that it will be the board's duty in most time as it hopes, to as carefully protect the trader on a falling market by permitting him to average his costs down as it must now carefully protect the consumer in compelling the trader to average his crop up.

While sugar has dropped to 15 cents in the United States because of the law of supply and demand has been allowed to take its course, in Canada the price has been fixed at 22 cents and shows no present signs of coming down. Price fixing on sugar (or rather limitation of profit) was instituted over a year ago and then, for no apparent reason than to teach a "dissatisfied people" the advantages of control, the board suddenly withdrew its control altogether.

Control Once More.
Then in July last, control was once more instituted and prices again fixed. The United States slump has apparently come about by heavy importations from countries outside of Cuba, including Java, Ceylon, and other places. Speculators have been caught on a glutted market. The old law of supply and demand has again reasserted itself and the justice department states that so far as it is concerned it shall take its course without artificial restrictions.

It was apparently the intention to let the retailer get rid of all sugar made of high-price "raws" upon the public before permitting the law of supply and demand to take its course, but the trouble is that all the sugar now being retailed in Canada is not the product of high-price "raws."

Just how far the board intends to continue its restrictions and just how far the Government proposes to permit it to do so is not known.

Functioning Poorly.
The board at the present time is functioning poorly, and is by no means a hive of industry. The Government has apparently forgotten its existence since the retirement of W. F. O'Connor, and the later and more sensational departure of Mr. Murdoch. The present board consists of Capt. Major Dillon, who during the war was connected with the work of internment of foreign-born Canadians, and A. Ackland, deputy minister of labor, who is still carrying on the duties of the office.

That organization at the outset was supposed to be temporary. It would now appear to be permanent. In the meantime it is interesting to speculate as to how far the board is interested in the question of how far a slump in the price of hides and wool is being reflected by a slump in the cost of boots and clothing.

CRANE CHAIN SNAPS LOAD OF PIPE FALLS ON SARNIA WORKMAN
Fred Fulkerson Has His Arm Broken, Injured Internally and Badly Bruised.

SARNIA, Sept. 2.—While at work tonight Fred Fulkerson, an employee of the Imperial Oil, Limited, residing on Ontario street, was seriously injured at the plant, and as a result lies in a dangerous condition at the Sarnia General Hospital, where he was removed following the accident. Fulkerson, with a number of others, was engaged in unloading a car of pipe with a crane. The young man, it is said, was directing the crane in the work, and while some of the pipe was being lifted from the car the chain snapped and the pipe fell on the unfortunate man. Dr. Leslie was summoned and the injured man was removed to the hospital, where his injuries were attended. On examination it was found that his leg was broken and that he was painfully bruised about the arms and shoulders and internally injured.

GREAT YIELD OF ONIONS ON HARWICH MARSHES
BLENHEIM, Sept. 3.—The great onion harvest on the Burke pumping scheme marshlands begins this week. Over 100 acres of fine onions are the product of this reclaimed land on the shore of Lake Erie in Harwich. It is estimated that the yield will be between 300 to 400 bags per acre, which at the current price, around \$2.50 per bag will yield the owners a splendid return.

Besides the onion crop there are on other portions of the property splendid crops of potatoes, beans, corn and sugar beets.

NO CHANGE IN STRIKE OF TEXTILE WORKERS
STRATFORD, Sept. 3.—Another meeting of the textile workers and the trades and labor council this evening was the only development in the strike of textile workers at the Avon Hosiery Company today. The meeting was addressed by Organizer Thomas of the textile workers; Arthur Briel, Montreal, of the Canadian executive board; members of the United Carpenters and Joiners; Fred Molinieux, Hamilton, general organizer of the German-born and Woodworkers' Union. Mrs. Tuff, president of the local union, says that more girls joined the strikers today. The Avon Hosiery factory is still picketed, and a policeman was on duty there this morning.

FIRE AT CRUMLIN
Barn and Two Houses Burned—Damage of \$1,500 Done.
Fire Chief John Attkin and No. 2 truck of the local department responded to a fire in Crumlin at 5:30 o'clock on Friday afternoon. Fifteen hundred dollars damage was done. A barn belonging to Samuel Stevenson being a total loss, and two houses, the property of Byron Broughton, being partially destroyed. Damages amounting to \$800 was done to the dwellings. The blaze spread from the barn to the houses, which were situated on either side of it.
