BRITISH WARSHIPS TO FIRE ON SOVIET SUBS, DECLARES CURZON

Rumors That Russian Submarines Had Put To Sea in Baltic Given As Reason by Bitish Government For Announcement-Curzon Charges Bad Faith On Part of

London, Oct. 10.—Any Russian submarines encountered on the high seas will be attacked on sight by British naval forces, according to a note sent by Earl Curzon, British foreign secretary, to M. Tchitcherin, the Russian Bolshevik foreign minister, on October 2, which is published along with other correspondence recently exchanged between Great Britain and Soviet Russia. Earl Curzon points out that he previously sent a communication regarding a submarine launched in the Black Sea, in which he said that in view of repeated declarations of leading members of the Soviet Government that the Government considered itself in a state of war with Great Britain, and in view of the Soviet Government were hostile or not, there was no alternative but to issue orders to British ships to attack the submarine should it be encountered on the high seas.

New York, Oct. 11.—The long arm of the law in New York State will reach out for taxes due from about 125 baseball players sharing in the receipts of the world's series.

Under the terms of the recently-enacted income tax law in this state, not only will the players who live within the state be taxed on their share of the receipts of world's series games played here, but those who reside in other states as well. The law affects not only the Cleveland and Brooklyn players, but the runners-up and third teams in each league—Chicago and New York in the American and New York and Cincinnati in the National.

The non-resident players, it was explained today, are taxable because they rendered "personal services" in New York. The National Commission will take out from the checks to non-residents an amount sufficient to pay the tax, whenever their shares are greater than the exemption allowed by the law. tax, whenever their shares are greater
