Commission Government For Hockey in London Is Latest Proposal

Governing Body Would Make at Least Junior O. H. A. Entry and Develop City Hockey League-Centralized Control Looks Like Good Plan.

A rift has appeared in London's hockeyless gloom as the result of a new plan whereby the fans will be assured of at least a junior hockey entry. The latest proposal is to form a hockey commission in London from members of the two clubs, the Hermitage and Orients, which have in the past undertook to look after hockey in the city and have been rather successful at the job, and two outside members who would in a way represent the hockey public in London.

This at a stroke centralizes control of hockey in London under interests who will have the whole game at heart, rather than the interests of any one club or organization.

This commission, as well as looking after the O. H. A. club, would take over the management of the City League, from which an entry into the second round of the Northern League would be made. Would Be an Independent Commission.

In the past there have been complaints from both fans and players as to treatment, and often ugly rumors. Under a commission form of government, allied with no one club or other organization, hockey affairs would be more or less wide open to players and fans alike.

Running hockey teams has been a thankless job in the past, and probably the new commission will have its troubles that way as well, but the abuse would be minimized and probably a better spirit of co-operation between players and commission, and finally fans and hockey, would be the
