DICTIONARY DISTRIBUTION

George Foster Appoints Honorary Advisory Council of Experts.

THORO INVESTIGATION

Expected to Be Greatly Expedited.

By a Staff Reporter.
Ottawa, Nov. 30.—As the result of a long study of the industrial situation in Canada Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, has come to the conclusion that much benefit would result from prompting and strengthening the application of science to the processes of production and manufacture. To assist in the work he has appointed the following honcrary advisory council on industrial and scientific research:

President, A. Stanley MacKenzie, Dalhousie University; Prof. F. D. Adams, McGill University; Prof. R. F. Ruttan, McGill University; Prof. J. C. McLennan, Toronto University; Prof. A. B. MacCallum, Toronto University; Prof. J. C. McLennan, R. Hobson, Steel Company of Canada, Hamilton; R. A. Ross, consulting electrical engineer, Montreal; Tancrede Bienvenue, general manager Banque Provincial.

Cabinet Sub-committee.

The advisory council will work under a sub-committee of the cabinet, consisting of Sir George Foster, Hon, Dr. Roche, Hon, E. L. Patenande, Hon, T. W. Crothers and Hon, Martin Burrell. This committee will be responsible for the expenditure of any money provided by parliament for scientific and industrial research.

The duties of the honorary advisory committee will be as follows: To consult with all responsible bodies and persons carrying on scientific and industrial research work in Canada with a view to hringing about united effort and mutual co-operation in solving the various problems of scientific and industrial research which from time to time present themselves.

To co-ordinate as far as possible the work so carried on so as to avoid overlapping of effort and to direct the various problems requiring solution into the hands of those whose equipment is best adopted thereto. ed thereto.

To select the most practical and pressing problems indicated by industrial necessities and present them when approved by the committee to research bodies for earliest possible solution.

To report from time to time the results of their work to the minister of trade and commerce.

BIG WINTER FAIR

Thirty-Third Annual Show Promises to Be Best on Record.

NUMEROUS ENTRIES

Canada's Industrial Advancement Directors Expect Keen Competition in the Various Classes.

> Guelph, Nov. 30 .- Today the 33rd annual Ontario Provincial Winter Fair will open at the big buildings adjoining the Guelph City Hall. Altho these are times of war, the stock breeder and the farmer have evidently realized the necessity of greater and better production. The indications all point to this year's winter fair being the largest and best in its long history. The entries for this show closed on Wednesday, Nov. 15, and since that time Secretary, R. W. Wade and his staff have been extremely busy getting the entries classified for they came the entries classified for they

> in thousands towards the finish.

> Mr. Wade states that this show furnishes a classification for light and heavy horses, beef and dairy cattle, sheep, swine, poultry and seeds, which cannot be surpassed. The entry list is a grand one and is extremely isfactory to the directors of the show. There are in the neighborhood of 300 entries of horses, the best breeders in the province being represented. Horses which have usually gone to the International Show at Chicago are this year being kept at Guelph, and will find that the competition in the various classes for horses will be keener than ever before.

The cattle show last year was easily he best in the history of the fair, but this year promises even better. There are considerably over 300 entries, exclusive of the 75 cows which have been entered for the dairy test, always an interesting feature of the show. There are 490 sheep entries, a record for the show; about 500 swine and about 375 seed entries.

The Poultry Show.
One of the outstanding features of the fair is the poultry show. Last year there were nearly 6000 birds on the fair state.

there were nearly 6000 birds on ex-hibition in the poultry department, and the space allotted for this section was filled to its capacity. The entries this time show that over 5000 birds will be seen, which, with the breeding pens and dressed poultry, should bring the number of birds on exhibition close to 6000, fully equal to last There will also be teams from 19

counties in western Ontario, which will compete for the inter-county judging trophy. This contest takes place Monday and Tuesday.

There will be, in addition to the regular exhibit, a number of very valuable demonstrations in types of market animals, both alive and dressed. with an expert in attendance to explain the various points and the desirable qualities in meat animals.
On Wednesday will be held a sale of prize seed, and farmers would do well to make a start in clean, fine seed, by attending the sale and purchasing the seed for next spring's seeding. On Wednesday and Thursday the

carcasses will be on display, and as they are arranged in order of merit, the visitor will have a fine opportunity making a careful study of these. The sale of dressed carcasses will be on Thursday, Dec. 7.

The show concludes on Thursday night with a grand parade of the prize

PETROGRAD SHIPS GOLD AND SECURITIES TO U.S.

Japanese Liner Delivers to Morga Total of Eighty Millions.

San Francisco, Nov. 30.—Gold, togethe with Russian and United States securities to the value of \$80,000,000, which arrived here yesterday on the Japanes liner Shinyo Maru, consigned direct from Petrograd to J. P. Morgan & Co., New York, was forwarded east today, Of this \$32,000,000 was in actual gold.

The big transfer from the Russian capital to New York explains why three prominent Russians of the bureau of financing of the Russian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, also arrived here on the Shiny Maru and proceeded east on the traicarrying the treasure.

It is said Russia has been spending over \$360,000,000 in the United State during the past 25 months for war munitions and railroad supplies.
