## EED EARNEST MEN, SAYS DR. RIBOURG

Genuineness is Factor Required in Social and Political Life of Canada.

MONDAY MORNING AUGUST 16 1920

Rev. Dr. Ribourg, preaching at St. Alban's Cathedral last evening, on "Undefiled Religion," said, in part: "Genuineness must be the essential quality of true religion. A man

whose religion is not convention but conviction, not pretence but conversion, not appearance but the living truth, not mechanical service, but a heart of love, is a man whose religion

is genuine and true.

"The church in these critical days, and especially in the days that are coming, needs earnest men and women, whose religion is in the conscience and in the heart, for religion is real only as it is translated in terms of life. 'What do ye more than others?' is the question which the non-church-goers are asking the Christians.
"Genuineness, righteousness and

"Genuineness, righteousness and love must rule in our social and political life, if we are to be a great people, worthy to frame the future country. The twentieth century people are no longer satisfied with mere pretense; the pious look and saintly appearance can no longer take the place of genuine character and sincerity.

The age of religiousness must yield to the new era of genuine religion.

"More and more should we be impressed with the necessity of teaching definite things, specific duties, personal truths, individual responsibility and particular consecration.
