Overcoming the Ship Scar- city

Shortage of bottoms has been felt on the Pacific coast, as elsewhere, but lack of ships, in one instance at least, has been overcome by Yankee ingenuity in a novel manner.

The government's orders for lumber for news ships, army cantonnments, etc., overtaxed carrying capacity of Pacific coastwise lines, and to get the logs from Oregon and Washington forests to the mills, the logs are chained together in huge rafts, 800 feet in length and 40 to 60 in width. The completed raft is oval in shape and has appearance of an im- mense turtle. It is picked up by a sea- going tug and towed to its destination, safe against U-boat attacks and at a very reasonable rate for freight. USE THE WAT AD. WAY
