The employe is required to answer any questions put to him by his employer for this nurpose.

The employer must then report as to which if any, of his men have failed to comply with the call. An employer who refuses of neglects to comply with the regulations is liable to a fine of not more than \$100 and not less than \$50 for each employe, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months or both fine and imprisonment.
