HOW TO GUARD HERE TO GET SAME AS THE MEN OVERSEAS

Some 9,000 Men in Canada Affected by New Order-in-Council

An order of great interest to members of the composite battery and the 62nd home guard detachment stationed here, and which will be eagerly welcomed by them, has been passed at Ottawa.

The order-in-council provides that men of the active militia engaged in home guard duty throughout the dominion shall be given the same subsistence allowance as men of the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

At present there are some 9,000 men on guard duty in Canada, the great majority of whom are unfit for overseas service, who receive the same rate of pay as members of the overseas forces.
