Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Lee Axtory, world's champion trotting stallion, lowered his own record at the New York State Fair ground circuit meet this morning, negotiating a mile in two minutes flat. Paced by two running horses, son of Guy Axtory never faltered during the trial against time, trotting half of the four quarters in exactly 30 seconds. Axtory's former record was 94.

Under perfect weather and track conditions his driver, Ben White, essayed to set the track record of 2:01 1/2, held by the Harvester, and his feat in also

shattering the world's record, horsemen say, will go down in history as one of the greatest achievements of the sport.

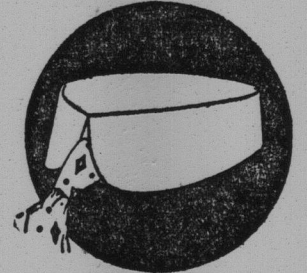
RING.

MARANVILLE MAY BE UNABLE TO FINISH SEASON

Boston, Sept. 12.—"Shabbitt" Maranville, star shortstop of the Boston Braves, has been forced to take a complete rest, and in all probability will be out of the game for the greater part of next week. For four days he has played every game, despite the fact that he had a broken nose, two eyes that were badly puffed and discolored as to make clear sight impossible and bearing great pain, but he has now been forced to take things easy. It was reported that Tom Hughes, a "no hit" twirler of the Braves, will be out of the game for the balance of the season.
