Nearly Million and Quarter In Conflict In East Prussia

Petrograd, Feb. 11—According to the expert of the Bourse Gazette more than 1,200,000 men are engaged in the conflict in East Prussia, which may be called the "Battle of Three Rivers". It is being fought on the banks of the Memel, Inster and Schechuppe rivers.

The heaviest fighting is now in the district about Lasdehnen. This town is now held by the Russians, but the German front is in the form of a half circle west of Lasdehnen. On the plain between the Memel and the Schechuppe the Germans have dug nine rows of trenches that can be taken by assault only with heavy losses.

A letter received in Fredericton from Lieut.-Col. H. F. McLeod, M. P., officer commanding the 12th New Brunswick Battalion, was written on January 25. He was then still in bed in the Military Hospital, but able to get up for a part of each day. He hoped to be able to get out in a few days, and it may be that by this time he has been able to rejoin his battalion. "I have been very lucky to get through," he said. "Three out of four in the next room to where I am now died of pneumonia in three days, and the doctors tell me that I had a very serious attack."

After sending kindest regards to his friends Lieut.-Col. McLeod closed the letter with the impressions he had gathered as to the war from reading English newspapers and discussing the situation with British officials. "This war has a long way to go yet," he wrote. "The Germans have just started. Kitchener says he doesn't know when the war will end, but it will be begun on May 1 next."


