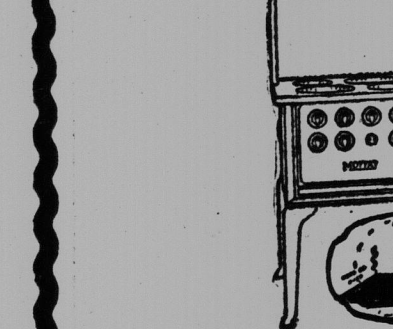

FORGOTTEN GEMS FOUND IN VAULT

Romance of Kimberley Diamond
Fields Comes to Light in
Capetown

LONDON, April 6.—A romantic story of a fortune made in the Kimberley diamond fields in the '90s, when that El Dorado was no more than a canvas camp of lawlessness, lies behind the following cable from Capetown:

The rotting of the covering of a sealed package in the strong room of the Standard Bank, Kimberley, revealed that the contents were diamonds valued at \$7,000. The package has not been claimed since it was deposited for safe custody by C. E. Cowie 40 years ago.

A South African now in London and formerly a close business acquaintance of Mr. Cowie, has related something of the bank and apparently forgot all about them.

"Mr. Cowie," he said, "was a very wealthy man who would never have missed the diamonds he left in the bank and apparently forgot all about them."

"He was one of the early pioneers of the Kimberley diamond mines, and secured his own claim. It was a very rich one, and he amassed a fortune."

HAS HER SON JAILED FOR THEFT OF GEMS

Mother's Rings Pawned By Boy
of 18 so He Could Marry
Show Girl, He Admits

NEW YORK, April 6.—Accused by his mother, Mrs. Lillian Anderson Stuart of the theft of three diamond rings, valued at \$4,000, from her apartment on March 10, Robert Stuart, 18 years old, was held in the Tombs in default of \$2,000 bail to await the action of the Grand Jury.

When arraigned before Magistrate Moses H. Hyttenberg in West Side Court, the boy admitted the theft. Assistant District Attorney Louis Wasser told the court that Stuart had taken the jewels so that he might marry Edna Marsh, a showgirl, 90 years old, of 2,082 Broadway. Young Stuart, the District Attorney said, believed himself the father of Miss Marsh's four-and-a-half-year-old daughter, Dorothy. Stuart said that he had pawned the jewels for \$700. Last Monday, he said, he took Miss Marsh to Union City, N. J., where they were married by "the Rev. Mr. Peterson." No clergyman of that name could be found last night. Miss Marsh, at her apartment last night, sent out word by a man who said he was her brother, that the clergyman's name was "Spencer," but no such clergyman could be located. Efforts to see Miss Marsh were fruitless, and she refused further information about herself over her telephone.

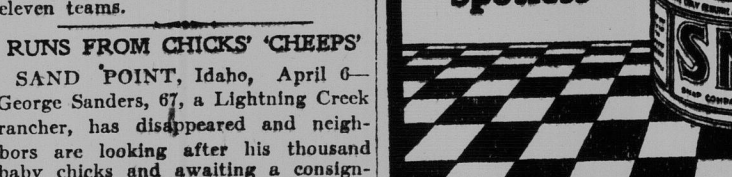
