**FIND \$40,000 IN LOOT
WOUNDED BURGLAR HAD**

Detectives Seize Opera Cloaks, Silver,
Cut Glass and Jewelry—Convict Bad-
ly Hurt.

Following the placing of William Me-
teliski, the "Masonic burglar," in the
Kings County Hospital, New York, suf-
fering from two gun shot wounds in-
flicted by Detective William Seckinger

make his escape after attempting to rob

tectives have recovered about \$40,000

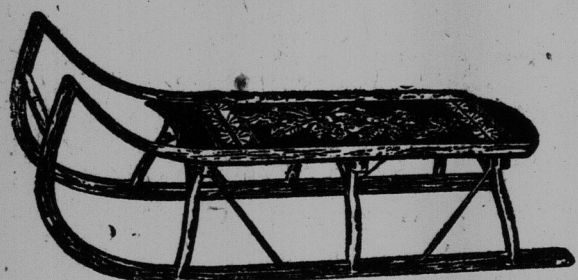

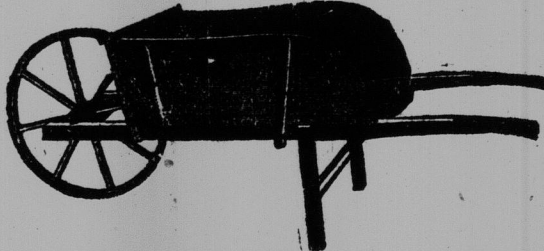
