

COMPLETE THE CONSIDERATION OF PLATFORM

Afternoon Session of National Council of Women Art Conference in Evening.

Yesterday afternoon and last evening had nine busy hours for the National Council of Women.

At the afternoon session in the institute the remaining clauses of the woman's platform were taken up.

Short's new phrasing for one clause was adopted as follows: "That necessary legislation be enacted to permit uniform marriage laws."

Minimum wage for women was agreed upon. Mrs. Murray, of Halifax, spoke in favor of the minimum wage.

Compulsory vocational training was discussed. Mrs. O. C. Edwards asked if men should be included in this clause.

The collective bargaining clause was adopted with the addition suggested by Mrs. L. A. Hamilton.

Eight-hour day eliminated. The eight-hour day was eliminated from the platform.

Domestic workers. Mrs. Hamilton, superintendent of the Victorian Order of Nurses said that the adoption of an eight-hour day for women would be a hindrance to the work of the mother at home and the production of the race would be crippled.

Others who spoke on the matter were Mrs. George Watt, Mrs. Morris and Mrs. MacNaughton.

The last plank having been dealt with, the platform as agreed to was adopted.

Mrs. Parsons' report went on to explain that while it had been felt that immigration should be discouraged to some extent until the returned soldiers were absorbed into civil life, at the present time eighty per cent of the soldiers were re-established and the essential resources should be developed.

Artisans go on the land were urgently needed. For the first time in a period of 120 years last year Canada received more immigrants than did the United States, and it was greatly to be desired that only the best kind of immigrant should be invited.

The report recommended closer cooperation with the motherland and the case of the report. The first, submitted by the Woodstock council was: "Resolved that definite steps be taken to strengthen the immigration restrictions of Canada and that special and closer examination be given at the port of embarkation by medical examiners experienced in defensive work."

As the result of practical experience gained by volunteer workers at the port of St. John and reported to this committee, he it resolved that the national council of women approach the minister of immigration and colonization with the request that responsible women of the Great Britain and at the Atlantic port of embarkation of the report and Mrs. E. A. Young, in accordance with the motion, sponsor the adoption of the report.

Mrs. Roberson gave a report of her work under the department of immigration in arranging for the reception of ex-service girls coming to Canada.

She said that of the 10,000 girls who had been expected, only 1,500 had been applied at the British office for transportation and of these only 1,100 had been passed.

The Canadian council for the immigration of women had established a coast-to-coast chain of hostels for the accommodation of these girls and when the girls were not forthcoming and 5,000 women household workers were urgently needed in Canadian country districts she had sent overseas to discover the cause.

The statistics which she had gleaned showed that 3,274 women had been conducted to Canada and of these 497 came to be married; 1,175 to join relatives; 1,437 to assured employment and 465 looking for employment.

She had hunted for the ex-service girls in England and had found that some had gone back to their old employments, some had found that their parents might come to Canada later but had no temporary employment in England and the majority had taken advantage of the government scheme of re-training for vocations which, while they were not forthcoming in fields of war times, were yet more attractive than house work.

She had found a 40,000 shortage in England. There was a class of untrained girls that showed some fancy for coming to Canada but it was doubtful if such girls would be induced to settle down in household work.

The governments of Ontario and Quebec were giving assistance in passage money to girls and it seemed that this was necessary to induce girls to come to Canada.

Follow-up work, done by the council of immigration, Mrs. Roberson spoke of as having been most useful. She stated that Canadian women give sympathetic treatment to the immigrant girls and she related how at the meeting of the advisory committee in London a letter written from an English girl at the hotel in St. John had been read.

This letter said the St. John hotel was the nicest possible and the matron the most motherly matron there could be and if all places in Canada were like St. John then the committee need have no fear in recommending that the girls be sent to the St. John hotel.

Mrs. Hamilton congratulated Mrs. Roberson on the splendid work of the council in carrying out the reception of the English girls. A resolution was then moved by Mrs. Short and after amendments was adopted as follows: Whereas cases marked for deportation at the ports may appeal to the minister of immigration and colonization and the decision of the officer in charge and whereas the minister's decision is final as to whether a mistake has been made and whereas in these appeals great pressure may be brought to bear on the minister to rescind an order of deportation and whereas it is resolved that we, the National Council of Women of Canada, request the government that the deputy minister of the department of the federal department of health be associated with the minister of immigration in being the final court of appeal in such cases, after consultation with the head of the municipality to which the case is designated.


Daniel J. Tobin, of Boston, was re-elected treasurer, and Frank Morrison, of Washington, secretary, without opposition.

Several important amendments to the pension act are suggested. Pensioners with less than 14 per cent disability are given the option of commuting their pensions.

Pensioners under the recommendations are based on the 1918 rate for those pensioners resident in Canada, the bonus recommended is 60 per cent over the basic rate, with 20 per cent bonus for those residing outside of the Dominion.
