Among the soldiers who returned home this week from Siberia was Sgt. Wallace V. Haselwood, of West St. John. Prior to going over seas he was with Dr. Barton, dentist. He is a son of the late Dr. John T. Haselwood of West St. John. He was warmly welcomed home by a host of friends.

INFORMATION WANTED.

HOSPITAL TRANSFER.
Major Colwell representative from the department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, was in the city yesterday in connection with the transfer of the Military Hospital, in Lancaster, to the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Commission. The transfer was completed yesterday. Major Thomas, who was officer in charge of the hospital, will still be retained by the district, while some other members of the staff will be transferred to the C. B. B. The hospital is purely a civil institution and will be used for the accommodation of the returned soldiers who have been returned to civil life.

The diamond was strange to the local nine and the bright colored clay hurt their eyes and as a result they got away to a poor start, losing several plays, but from that on they put up a stellar brand of ball. A fair sized crowd of fans witnessed the contest and generous applause good plays made by both teams. Today the St. John boys play in Woodville, Me., and tomorrow will play in Milltown, going to Calais on July 4.

DOG POISONER AT WORK

A dog poisoner has been at work at Millidgeville. Within the last few days a red cocker spaniel owned by J. Fraser Gregory was poisoned and died while two valuable bull terrier puppies owned by Lieut. L. McC. Ritchie, of the dispersal station are just coming around with careful treatment after a nefarious attempt to end their lives with strychnine. Mr. Gregory's dog was not tied up, but the pups of Mr. Ritchie, which are about four months old, were in their kennels so that the poison must have been put in deliberately through the cages. He consulted a "vet" and it was proved that there had been strychnine used. With the quick application of an antidote the dogs were brought around but they are still quite weak. It is said that there is good knowledge as to who perpetrated the contemptible act.

CHARGE OF THEFT OF \$350 AT MCADAM

Fredrickton, N. B., July 2 — Clifford Slater, of McAdam, is now in the York county jail here having been sent up for trial by Luke Lawson, J. P., of McAdam, on the charge of theft. Slater was charged with stealing \$350 from William Robinson, of McAdam, taken from Robinson's trunk at the Royal Hotel in that village. Constable John Blair made the arrest, and Sheriff Hawthorn brought the man to Fredrickton.

HIS ANKLES CHAINED

Young Man Thus Being Taken To Penitentiary Today
Seeing a young man with a heavy chain tightly fastened about his ankles, allowing barely space enough to walk, passing through the Union Depot at noon today people wondered if an anarchist or a murderous Bolshevik had been at his antics. It proved, however, only to have been a young fellow, Leonard Matthews, who was being taken to the Donchester by Sheriff Stewart from St. Andrews to serve a term of two years on a charge of stealing.

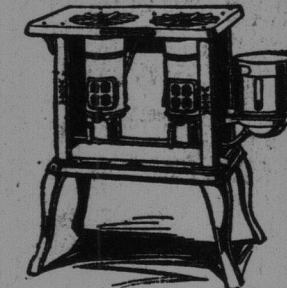

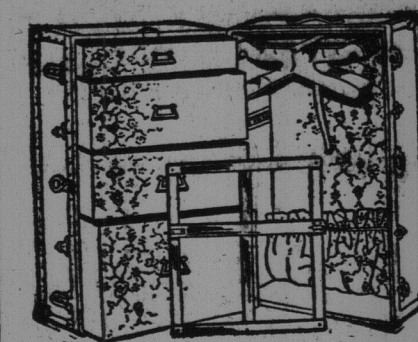
