THE LATE REV. DR. WILSON
Sketch of Life of Zion Pastor Read at St. John Methodist District Meeting

In connection with the St. John district Methodist meetings held this week the following sketch of the life of the late Rev. Dr. Wilson was read:
Robert Wilson, Ph. D., was born on February 18, 1835, died June 24, 1912. These dates define the limits of the earthly life of a devoted servant of God whose redeemed powers made true contribution to the triumph of Christ's Kingdom among men.
His progenitors were Scotch, his father being Sergeant Peter Wilson of the 68th Highlanders. During the rebellion of 1857 the family moved to Prince Edward Island, where two brothers and a sister who survive the deceased, still reside.
The son, Robert, was educated at the common schools and Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, after which he engaged in the teaching profession for a short period.
He was converted more than sixty years ago in the great revival in Charlottetown, conducted by Rev. Frederick Smallwood; immediately united with the Bible Christian Church and soon after entered the ministry. After supplying two circuits, in 1885, he joined the Methodist church, in which he speedily attained to a position of honor and influence, which was maintained through all his lengthy ministry.
He was married in 1866 to Miss Mary A. Ford, who predeceased him by seven years; and the surviving members of the family are one son and four daughters.

Comparatively late in his ministry he took a post graduate course in the University of Chicago where the degree of Doctor of Philosophy was conferred.
Of the high estimation which the church placed upon the character and services of Doctor Wilson there is indication in the important offices to which he was appointed. For four years he was secretary of the conference, was chairman of district, and in 1887 was made president of the conference. He was a member of the general conference in 1889, 1890 and 1898. In these and other offices which he filled there was sufficient display of statesmanlike ability to reflect credit upon himself and honor upon his church.
Doctor Wilson ministered to circuits at West Cape and Montague, P. E. I.; Fairville, Kingston, Hopewell, St. Andrews, Sheffield, Marysville, Gibson, Bate Vertie, Salisbury, Exmouth street, Queen Square and Zion (St. John), in which latter church he was pastor for twelve years prior to his retirement. In all these fields he saw the work of God prosper in his hands, a deep interest in spiritual realities being awakened and in many instances widespread revivals occurring. The handsome edifice at Marysville, recently destroyed by fire, was built during his pastorate.
In public affairs he took the keenest interest and assumed positions of trust and honor. He was president of the St.

John Branch of the Evangelical Alliance, president of the local branch of Imperial Federation, he held high positions in the Sons of Temperance and Good Templars, filling besides many other public positions, especially in the City of St. John, where for so long a time he resided. A firm believer in the natural resources and possibilities of Canada, in pulp and on platform, by speech and by pen, he persistently set forth the advantages of life in this colony, and in the year 1888-1889 he made an extensive tour in England in official relationship to the Canadian government, lecturing in the interests of Canadian immigration. His literary attainments were of a high order, and possessed of a style which was chaste and commanding, he wielded a pen which made his writings at all times both popular and persuasive. For some time he published a weekly paper called "The Methodist." He wrote for many magazines and reviews, and often acted as correspondent for daily newspapers. He was the author of several small works, and in the later years of his life occupied himself with the Mac of a volume on Methodism in the maritime provinces.
Possessed of a great versatility of gifts, it was very natural that he should have exercised them in many different departments of the world's activity, but Doctor Wilson was at all times, first of all a minister of the Gospel of Christ, and his home was his throne. His style of preaching was not declamatory, but simple and earnest, with sufficient intellectual charm to arouse keen interest and to command large congregations. As a pastor he entered sympathetically

into the lives of his congregation, bearing their grief and carrying their sorrows. As a friend he was faithful and valuable and would frequently give surprise by some intimation which showed that quietly but vitally he carried his friends' interest close to his heart. In Christian belief, this servant of God found full satisfaction for his heart in the Gospel of Christ and its interpretation as found in Methodist doctrine. Although he was not unacquainted with modern critical speculations, yet down to the last he stood soldierlike for the defence of a faith once for all delivered to the Saints.
Although for some years Doctor Wilson held a supernumerary relationship to the church and was for a long time in failing health, yet down to the last he was alive to all the varied interests of the church and the moral life of the community.
On Monday, June 24, 1912, then in his 80th year, the eyes of this Christian saint and warrior were closed forever to all earthly scenes, and in the calm and simple and triumphant Christian faith in which he walked through all his days, so passed he unto the presence of his God and King, and entered upon the full and perfect and eternal joy and service of Heaven.
