
WILL INVESTIGATE

Ottawa, May 23.—The House of Commons, yesterday, without division, dopted a motion by E. Guss Porter Conservative, West Hastings), calling for reference to the committee on crivileges and elections of the withdrawal by Hon. James Murdock, Minster of Labor, of a deposit of \$4,050 from the Home Bank two days before the failure.

Briefly, the charge is that Mr. Murdock obtained knowledge through his position as Cabinet Minister that the Home Bank was about to fail. Immediately after the Cabinet meeting, at which this knowledge he is said to have obtained, he went to the Home Bank and drew out his money, which he deposted in the Royal Bank. This occurred in August, 1923. In January particulars of the transaction were published in Conservative newspapers. Mr. Murdock took no action until the following May, when, on receipt of a letter from the curator of the defunct bank calling his attention to the matter, he stated that he would return the money, and has already returned about half of it.
