

SHOOT RADIO MESSAGE IN DIRECT LINE

Straight Communication Between England and Australia is Likely.

MARCONI DOES IT

Premier Bruce Says Whole Transmission Position Must be Revised.

(Canadian Press.) London, May 23.—The possibility of transmitting radio messages in a "beam" between Great Britain and Australia is likely soon to be demonstrated, according to the newspapers, which make a feature today of an announcement in the Australian House of Representatives by Premier Bruce yesterday.

The Premier is quoted in a Melbourne despatch as saying that the whole position of radio transmission should be radically changed within the last fortnight, which some writers interpret as showing that Senator Marconi's prediction of the transmission of definite distance has now become possible of fulfillment through a perfection of method.

The Australian Premier told the House he was eager to disclose the particulars, but that the British Government had not yet given permission for such publicity. The opinion is expressed here that if the "beam" system justifies the claims made for it, the contemplated schemes for inter-continental radio transmission must be revised, and such works as the Giant Hill-Morton Station, near Rugby, now under construction, may be regarded as already obsolete.

Senator Marconi, world famous wireless inventor, announced development of a system of directional radio transmission early last December at a meeting of the Wireless Telegraph Company in London.
