

CHICAGO, May 19-You are in far greater danger in crossing the streets of any city in America than you are

in speeding across the country, 60 miles an hour on a railway train. This state-ment was made here by R. H. Aishton,

President of American Railway Association Makes Statement on Danger.

"In New York city alone 963 persons were killed in automobile accidents during 1924, while in Chicago 560 were motor victims," he continued. In Philadelphia automobile fatalities numadelphia automobile fatalities numbered 270; in Detroit there were 302 killed; in Cleveland there were 214; St. Louis, 192; Boston, 137; Pittsburg, 154, and Los Angeles, 263."

Although the years 1923 and 1924, saw the greatest traffic in railway history, Aishton stated that there was a decrease in the number of fatal accidents among employes.


