Increase in Bank Rediscount Rate Has Telling Effect on Market

SMELTERS SLUMP ON MONTREAL MART

Drop 4 1/2 Points, But Recovers Two—Brazilian Active But Weaker

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Stock prices reacted sharply at the opening of today's market in reflection of the unexpected increase in the New York federal reserve bank rediscount rate after the close of the market yesterday. General motors broke three points on the first step, and initial losses of 1 to nearly 2 points were recorded by U. S. Steel common, Bethlehem Steel, Willys Overland, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, Studebaker, Cerro de Pasco, American Car and Foundry and Baltimore and Ohio.

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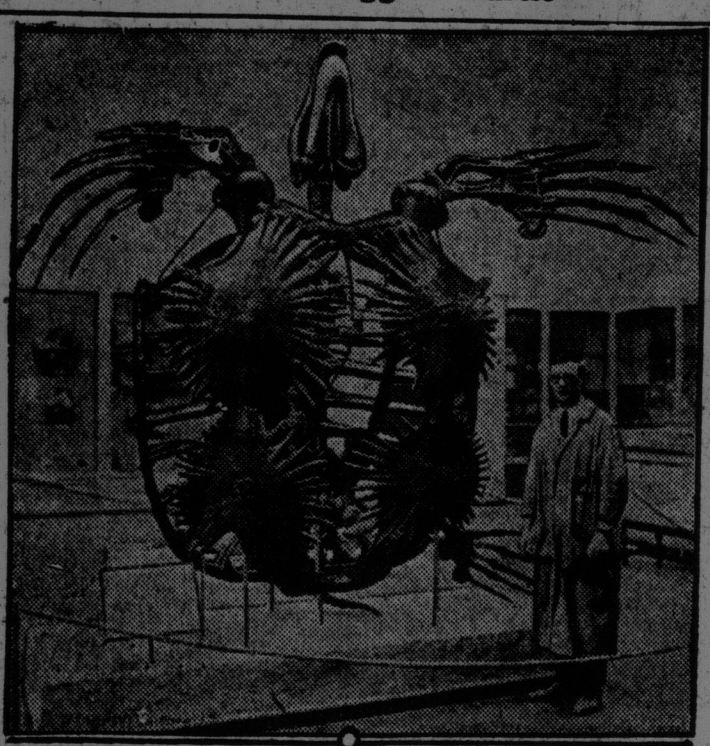

School Established For Girl Farmers

LONDON, Jan. 8.—To add to the inducements that the English colonies are holding out to prospective colonists it is now proposed to establish a school for girl farmers. While the boys are being trained on one farm in the art of plowing and handling stock, the girls are to be trained in a school nearby in the art of becoming farmers' wives. The first party will consist of 12 girls. They will sail for New Zealand early in February and will receive their training on a fine estate near Palmerston. 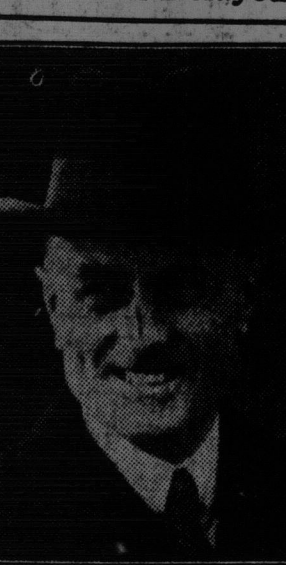
THE SEWING MACHINE.

The first sewing machine was invented by Thomas Saint, an Englishman, in 1790, says The Pathfinder. It could sew only plain stitches and was designed chiefly for sewing on leather. Some years later a Frenchman named Thimolier brought out an improved machine for sewing cloth. In 1833 Walter Hunt, an American, introduced the first lockstitch machine, but neglected to take out a patent. About 12 years later Elias Howe produced a machine. Howe was ignorant of the fact that Hunt had previously invented an almost identical one, and Howe's was the first patented lockstitch machine.

BOGUS LAWYER IS SENT TO SING SING

Fraud Was Charge—Never Admitted to Bar But Practiced Ten Years

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Following his plea of guilty last August to grand larceny, William F. Gosner, 33 years old, formerly of 1749 Grand course, the Bronx, was sentenced this week to from two-and-a-half to five years in Sing Sing, by Judge Albert Cohn in the Bronx County Court. It was said Gosner, who practiced law for ten years and then was found never to have been admitted to the bar, defrauded clients out of sums aggregating \$40,000. Sentence was deferred until now on Gosner's promise to make restitution. He failed to do so.

New Santa Barbara Earthquake Proof

SANTA BARBARA, Jan. 8.—Santa Barbara will soon be an "earthquake-proof" city. All of the new construction here is supervised by city experts to prevent a repetition of the disaster that levelled the city last June. None of Santa Barbara's business establishments would have been shaken down had they been properly constructed, with steel and concrete reinforcements, it is contended.

Seek To Save Boy Sentenced To Die

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 8.—Application for the commutation of the death sentence imposed on William Cavalier, 15-year-old Schuylkill County boy, convicted of killing his grandmother, for purposes of robbery, has been filed with the State Board of Pardons. He is under sentence to die in the electric chair during the week of Feb. 1.
