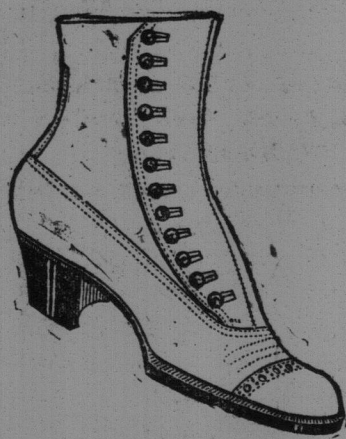

## MR. LOWELL IN TOUR OF THE WARDS

**Gets Big Reception From Workers in Committee Rooms—Fine Meeting at Golden Grove**

The workers in several of the city wards among them Wellington, Dufferin, Kings, Prince and Victoria, were visited by James Lowell, the Liberal candidate for the city and county, last evening and he was enthusiastically received in the rooms by a large crowd of earnest workers. Lowell, he said, had seen so much enthusiasm evinced by the party as was the case this time and all signs pointed to a Liberal sweep. He gave a rousing speech in each ward room and was applauded to the echo. He dealt with the advantages of reciprocity on the lumber market. St. John he said, would lose some of its big mills if reciprocity did not carry. Stetson Cutler & Co. were one firm which would remove their mills if the issue was not supported, taking them to Maine in order to be clear of the duty of \$70,000 which would have to be paid, and this alone would mean a loss of \$140,000 in wages to the workmen of St. John. It would also effect the merchants and dealers.

William G. Pugsley, W. J. Mahoney, Dr. Thomas H. Loney and Frank Hannum dressed a large gathering of electors in the hall at Golden Grove last night in support of Mr. Lowell and reciprocity. Councillor Adams acted as chairman. Every seat in the hall was occupied. Mr. Pugsley was the first speaker and referred to the sources of wealth in Canada and emphasized the fact that all but the manufacturers were favorably affected by the proposed reciprocity agreement. He went very fully into the question of Canadian trade with the United Kingdom and the United States and maintained that about 80 per cent of the items mentioned in the list of Canadian exports represented goods which were sent more largely to the United States than to Great Britain.

Mr. Mahoney showed how the Tories of today are allowing themselves to be led by the hands of the great trusts and combined interests. Reciprocity, he held, was one of the strongest arguments used for confederation, it being argued that with the provinces united the chances of securing reciprocity would be greatly increased. He went fully into the reciprocity question and proved most conclusively that the adoption of the trade agreement would not result otherwise than in the best interests of the farmers, fishermen and lumbermen.

Dr. Loney gave an able address in support of the trade agreement. His speech was entertaining as well as convincing and he was accorded a very warm reception. The way in which he illustrated his remarks by many pointed stories was one of the pleasant features of the evening. Frank Hannum followed in a short address. At the September session of the Albert court in Hawley yesterday, the cases of the King vs. J. B. Gildard and the King vs. Allen Kinsner were thrown out. It being Judge Barry's first appearance on the bench in Albert an address was presented to him.

The September sitting of the Kings circuit court opened in Hampton yesterday, Justice Landry presiding. All cases were adjourned until Oct. 10. In the matter of The King vs. J. P. Connolly, charged with rape, the defendant did not appear and a bench warrant was ordered issued unless he enters immediately into his own recognizance for \$5,000 and two sureties for \$2,500 each. Thomas Gallagher, charged with theft, gave \$2,000 bail. Ed. McMillen, attempted rape, gave \$2,000 bail.

Lima, Peru, Sept. 5.—Reports received here state that the Chilean steamer Tuxepal has been wrecked, and is a total loss. Eighty-one persons were drowned.

## BETTER MARKETS WILL SOLVE THE PROBLEM OF ABANDONED FARMS

"It is very apparent that something must be done to fill up our vacant farms in Pictou county. If my memory serves me, there was only one farmer's son put on the list in this section in 1911, out of a total population of about 3,200 people. They are leaving the farms, which are now largely tenanted by old people. I have been told in the vicinity of Sunny Brae, on the East River, there are eighty-two vacant farms, and that in Plainfield one can walk from a certain spot ten miles toward the county line, and not get off the vacant farms. There are schools in this vicinity which twenty years ago had sixty pupils, and today have only three. That alone should be enough to make anyone willing to support anything offering a fair probability of making an improvement in the situation; and that is something which I think it cannot be denied reciprocity is likely to do."—Alexander McKay.

## FORMER CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE SPEAKING FOR TRADE AGREEMENT

**J. C. Manzer on Platform for Pius Michaud and Reciprocity—Campaign News in Province**

Andover, Sept. 5.—The Liberal campaign in Victoria-Madawaska goes with a swing and there seems to be little doubt that Mr. Cormier's friends will lose the amount of his deposit on election day. Last night at an enthusiastic meeting at Scotch Colony, J. C. Manzer, one of the leading Conservatives of the county, and their candidate against Hon. John Costigan in a recent election, appeared on the platform with Mr. Michaud and gave his reasons for supporting the government.

Mr. Manzer gave it as his opinion that the raising of farm produce of all kinds would be given a great impetus by the trade agreement.

It is stated that Hon. John Morrissey will take the field next week in favor of reciprocity, so thoroughly is he imbued with its good points. His sons, Charles and John, are both working hard and effectively for Mr. Loggie and their work is having great effect up river. Mr. Loggie is speaking tonight at Bay du Vin.

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 5.—The municipal elections in York county took place today and resulted in the return of eleven new councillors. A feature of the election was the attempt of the Tory machine to introduce party politics. In the parish of Stanley the persons engaged in such tactics received a rebuff. Conn. Stirling, upon whom a dead set was made, being elected at the head of the poll. In St. Mary's such tactics were more successful and Conn. G. Fred Pond, against whom every effort was directed, met defeat.

That Albert county will give Dr. McAlister a large majority is the opinion of S. S. Ryan, ex-M. P. P., of Coverdale, Albert county, who spent yesterday in the city. The Liberal meetings being held throughout the county, he says, are largely attended and the greatest enthusiasm prevails.

One of the largest and most enthusiastic meetings of the reciprocity campaign was held in St. Andrews last night. The speakers were Senator Gillmor, Senator King and W. F. Todd, the Liberal candidate. The hall was packed and the speakers were listened to most attentively. Judging from the enthusiasm displayed at the meeting, St. Andrews may be trusted to roll up a big vote for reciprocity.

**OBITUARY**  
**Dr. Doherty**  
Richibucto, N. B., Sept. 5.—(Special)—Dr. Doherty, a physician, well known throughout the province, died at his home Saturday afternoon. About two weeks ago Dr. Doherty was in St. John attending the Masonic Grand Lodge. He was born at South Branch, Aug. 1, 1831, and took a preliminary course at Mt. Allison. He graduated from the New York Medical School in 1851. For several years he has been the oldest practitioner in the province. Besides his wife, five children survive. They are Dr. W. W. of Campbellton, Dr. R. P. of Great Village, Fred, of Atlin (B. C.); Miss Catherine, at home, and Mrs. Hugh Jardine, of Moncton. The funeral took place on Monday and was very largely attended.
