Missionary Meeting at Coley's Point

The Methodist Church at Coley's Point, was filled to its entire capacity on Thursday night, Dec. 11th, when the Annual Missionary meeting was held. Mr. I. Morgan, a senior worker in the above church, occupied the chair and in a few well-chosen remarks introduced the speakers of the evening.

Rev. Chas. Howse read the financial report for the year, which was well received.

Rev. H. Coole, of Claret's Beach, was the next speaker. His address took the form of a sketch of the lives of five men, representing the races of China, Japan, Korea, India and South America, whom he had known intimately while engaged in his studies at University in Boston, Mass. Each man with his temperament and view of life represented the nations with whom our missionaries are daily coming in contact with. Here they had gathered from the remote corners of the earth engaged in the study of the Gospel which casts out sin—the Gospel of Christ. The audience listened very attentively throughout the time of his address.

Rev. Chas. Lench, of Bagin, was the next speaker. Just back from the Holy Lands, Rev. Lench gave a brief but graphic account of his recent tour. Landing in England, his first visit was to the home of his boyhood, where with pleasure he met his old friends. Then with a party of about 70 others, Rev. Lench sailed to Egypt, Palestine, etc. As the lecturer took his audience of fancy to the scenes of the ministry of Christ, he imparted a great conception of his subject.

After each lecture Rev. Lench's popularity increased and his hearers are always eager to see him again.

At the conclusion of the meeting a collection was taken to be devoted to the Mission Fund and a presentation of prizes was made to the Juvenile Collectors.

A similar meeting will be held at Shearstown to-night (Friday).

SCHOONER LOST.

Word was received by A. S. Rendell & Co., on Dec. 11th, that their schooner the Esther Hankinson had been lost and Capt. Collett and six of the crew had landed at Monte Video, after being rescued from the sinking ship. The boatswain, Peter Slaigo, was drowned while attempting to fix a rudder for the disabled craft. The Hankinson left Cadiz on Oct. 9th for Little Bay Islands with a load of salt and nothing was heard of her until yesterday. The news of the safety of the crew will be heard with relief by the relatives of those on board the ill-fated vessel, while general sympathy is felt for the relatives of the young man who was drowned.

New Ship in Gulf

Arrangements are in progress for the building of a new steamer for the Port aux Basques-North Sydney service. She is to be constructed by one of the big shipbuilding firms in Scotland and will be somewhat larger than the S.S. Lintrose, costing about \$450,000, specially equipped with a heavy sheathing to contend with the ice.

Leaves for Canada

The Prime Minister, Hon. W. S. Monroe, Colonial Secretary, Hon. J. R. Bennett and the Minister of Justice, Hon. W. J. Higgins, left by Thursday's express for Canada where they will deal with the Labrador Boundary question. At Montreal they will confer with members of the Federal Government of Canada with a view to settling the dispute. A large number of citizens, Departmental Heads and Members of the House of Assembly gathered at the Station and as the train pulled out the cheering was loud and long as expressions of goodwill for the delegation.

Close Season on Caribou

The meeting of the Game Board at St. John's on Thursday night approved a close season of three years for Caribou and it has met the approval of the Government. The reports of the supervisors, wardens and guides to the Game Board show that the migration of the Caribou from one part of the country to the other has largely ceased but whilst there are a considerable number of animals located in some parts they seem to be in places where they can easily be slaughtered. The regulations were deemed necessary in order to prevent their extinction. There is a rapid increase in moose, but there is reason to fear that many are being slaughtered.

On recommendation of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and under the provisions of Section 10 of Chapter 11 of the Consolidated Statutes (Third Series) and in order to save the Lobster Fishery from extinction His Excellency the Governor-in-Council has been pleased to approve of the following amendment of the Regulations made on the first day of November, 1921, respecting the Lobster and other Fisheries, namely:

No person shall kill, take, Catch, sell or can any Lobsters, nor shall any person engage in the business of canning lobsters, at any place, or on any portion of the coast in the Colony, for a period of three years commencing on the First day of January, 1925, and ending on the Thirty-first day of December, 1927.
