

## Mass Meeting In St. Andrew's Church

Mayor Hayes Presided at Session Last Evening in Interests of Inter-Church Forward Movement — Able Address by Dr. Braithwaite.

In the interests of the United National Campaign Inter-Church Forward Movement a mass meeting was held last evening at St. Andrew's Church. Mayor Hayes presided, and on the platform were Rev. H. A. Goodwin, Rev. F. S. Dowling, Rev. S. S. Phelps, Rev. Edward F. McI. Smith, Secretary of the Provincial Organization, and Dr. Braithwaite. Rev. Canon Armstrong sent word that he regretted that he was unable to be present. Mayor Hayes expressed sympathy with the movement and voiced his readiness to assist in any possible way.

Rev. H. S. B. Strohman, of Chatham, organizer of the Methodist Church, and Archdeacon Crowfoot, organizer for the Diocese of Fredericton, told of the encouraging progress made in their communities.

Rev. Mr. Smith introduced the speaker of the evening, Rev. E. E. Braithwaite, M. A., Ph.D., recently President of the Western University, a man in every way qualified as organizer of the National Campaign.

Dr. Braithwaite told of the extensive nature of publicity which would be undertaken when great use would be made of the daily press, and bill, board, throughout the country would be "used." The churches everywhere are practically saying that they accept the challenge of the world and are endeavoring to realize their ideals. Feeling that the true spiritual foundation is a basis, we are stressing intercession, he said. National programs such as graft in political circles the church will realize she must follow up. The Forward Movement will crystallize the moral sentiment of the country and public life will be uplifted. The speaker dwelt on the need of the Gospel in foreign lands, and the financial support for the movement, which he was sure would be as freely offered for the Kingdom of Christ as it was during the war for the country's sake. A new era has come and a new era will be felt in the life of the church. The address concluded with an inspiring appeal for individual effort. A solo by Thomas Guy was given during the taking of the offering, and the Benediction was pronounced by Rev. F. S. Dowling.

**COMMON COUNCIL MET IN COMMITTEE**

Delegation Present Resolution Passed by Board of Trade in Favor of Early Plebiscite on Harbor Commission.

The common council met in committee yesterday morning. A delegation from the Board of Trade composed of President R. B. Emerson, H. C. Schofield, A. H. Wetmore, W. E. Golding and M. E. Agar with Secretary Armstrong presented the resolution recently passed at the Board of Trade meeting in favor of an early plebiscite on harbor commission. The delegation presented a number of arguments for a plebiscite and for harbor commission. After these had been read to the council Mr. Emerson thanked the committee for the kind reception and the delegation withdrew. A letter from R. H. Parsons, Carleton, was read, stating that he would like to open up negotiations with the Commissioner of Public Works, with a view of securing the old Market building on Market Square, Carleton, to carry on special work among the boys and young men of the West Side. Referred to Commissioner Thornton. The Commissioner of Public Safety was authorized to call for tenders for 400 yards of navy blue serge cloth for firemen and policemen's uniforms.

All I do is advertise the hours I want some help, and I get all kinds of good answers. Many women who couldn't possibly take steady work are only too thankful these days to make some extra money by doing in your house for a few hours just what they do in their own. I think if we are going to dignify housework it is the best way to begin. Ever so many people I know in Rosedale are finding this plan works splendidly."

"Women are doing it now in England, too," said an Old Country visitor, "especially are the middle-class girls going out in this way to help their homes. They have been well grounded in housework and they are sensible enough to see that it is easier for them to do this work than to have to take special courses, enter a grubby office, and live in grubby quarters."

**TORONTO HAS MANY CASES OF SMALLPOX**

Toronto, Nov. 4.—Dr. C. J. Q. Hastings, Toronto, Medical Officer of Health, estimates that there are 100 cases of smallpox in Toronto. The number of cases actually reported is now twenty. The M. O. H. has given instructions that all school children and pupils of colleges in this city be vaccinated. An increase in the number of cases is regarded as likely.

## MARITAL TROUBLES BEING AIRED IN DIVORCE COURT

Ten Cases Before Judge Crockett for Consideration This Term.

Fredericton, Nov. 4.—The divorce court met this morning with ten cases on the docket.

M. G. Teed, K. C., of St. John, had given notice of motion for a new trial in the Pitt-Randolph case, but as he was not present, H. G. Penick, clerk of the court, moved that Mr. Teed's motion be stood over. The motion for a new trial will be argued in chambers.

Upon motion of J. H. Auld, of Sussex, the case of James William Cook, of Penobscus vs. Mamie A. Cook, of Sussex, was made a remand and upon motion of Daniel Mullin, K. C., the case of Ernest Roland Price vs. Ida May Price, parties of St. Stephen, was also made a remand. These cases will be stood over until the next sitting of the court.

The case of Arthur Bedford Crossman vs. Eva Crossman, parties of Moncton, was then taken up. After the papers were read setting out the specific charges she plaintiff was called to give evidence. He said he enlisted on November 24, 1914, and went overseas in 1915. In London, England on March 29, 1918, he married the defendant and two days later he left for France, returning in April, 1919, and soon after he sailed for Canada. Meanwhile his bride had sailed for Canada in December, 1918, and he alleges that the defendant is a lawless and dissolute life and had been unfaithful to her marriage vows, and that in August, 1919, she was the mother of a child of which he is not the father.

In Andrews vs. Andrews, the plaintiff Mrs. Bertha H. Andrews, of West St. John, gave evidence that the defendant husband, who went overseas with the First Continental, while on furlough committed adultery with a woman in St. John. Mrs. Muriel McCallum, Stanley Brown, Robt. W. Stevens and R. W. L. Tibbitts were also called as witnesses.

Mr. Tibbitts' evidence had to do with the registration of the clergyman who married the parties, the evidence of the others was with regard to the defendant's misconduct. Court considered. The case of Montford vs. Montford was unfinished when the court adjourned until tomorrow. After the plaintiff had told of his marriage and departure overseas, Mrs. Frances Maud Chase swore that she lived in the same house with defendant wife while the 236th McLean Highlanders were stationed here, and knew that Joseph J. Thompson of that unit lived with defendant as her husband. The case will be continued tomorrow. Carson vs. Carson was made a remand upon motion of J. King Kelley.

Mayor Hayes promised to bring the resolution before the council meeting.
