

GENOA WORST PLACE IN WORLD FOR CONFERENCE

Italian Genius for Disorganization Poura Oil on the Fire.

Genoa, April 12.—The threatened trouble between the Fascist and Radical parties, riots and such like in connection with the conference—all failed to come off and a goodly portion of the Italian army is present to take a hand in case it may get materialized. The weather is brilliant, the sea dancing and the populace apparently happy and calm and enjoying the hospitality, holidays and spectacles of the conference.

Along the thirty-mile conference front—between beautiful Rapallo on the west end to where the San Remo road dips into the sea in the west—thirty-four delegations yesterday enjoyed the powerful shocks of the Sabbath afternoon amid semi-tropical warmth and luxuriance.

That is to say, all but the chief delegates of the "Convening Powers" who are laboriously wrestling with the problems of how the problem of Genoa is to be solved. It must be remembered that at Genoa there is to be no more Supreme Council, no more All-Italy, no more and no less. Therefore, at yesterday's session the former Supreme Council got around itself by becoming "the convening Powers."

The entire problem seems to be a result of the choice of Genoa as a meeting place and the Latin genius for disorganization in which Italy even excels France. But Italy had to have the conference because it was "Italy's turn." Therefore, upon Genoa must fall the greater blame unless "the convening Powers" wish to be fair and place the blame where it belongs, namely, upon themselves. The question: "Why Genoa?" has been asked ever since it was first suggested at the conference of Cannes by a member of the Italian delegation, who also happened to be a prominent citizen of Genoa and naturally wished to do the home town a good turn.

Genoa seems almost the worst place where a world congress or even any large conference should be held. It is a city of steep hills, narrow streets and streets and mediocre small hotels. If one desires to visit a delegation on the west side, it is more than likely the cabby will start down east and, if then called to halt, will explain that the hills are easier that way and that eventually he can work around to the neighborhood desired.

Furthermore, the telegraph and telephone facilities to enable the world's press to handle the news of the conference and concerning which large promises were made by the Italian Government, have been entirely inadequate. The Italians, quite friendly about it, place the blame on the French, and explain they have plenty of wires and operators in Genoa. But that France has not given sufficient wires to clear the news to the cable heads. The French on their side, report a storm in central France which has interfered. The Italians respond with a "diplomatic storm" and there you are.

As yet even official wires are not working, all of which is intensely displeasing to several delegations, including the British. As at all European conferences, the best source of information is the British press, and so far as Genoa is the only one that has supplied a single scrap of news to the press, which nearly a thousand representatives are now here. Lord Riddell is not here. Possibly on account of the too great recent publicity surrounding his role as chief of the British press bureau, his place has been taken by Sir Edward Cross, who in the absence of a proper place in the building allotted to the press, is endeavoring to hire a room to receive the press on the roof. The best press sessions of the conference will be held.

WIGMORE IMPROVED SERVICE BUT REDUCED WATER RATES

His Vote in the Primaries Expression of Confidence in His Regime, 1912-18 — Some Striking Figures.

Men and Women Electors of St. John:

Your very hearty expression of confidence in me in the primary elections was, indeed, most highly gratifying and can only be accounted for by the fact that my administrative record as Commissioner of Water and Sewerage for the six years from 1912 to 1918 is remembered with general approval. From 1912, complaints as to insufficient water pressure were both bitter and frequent. Scarcely a serious fire occurred that the newspapers did not comment on the lack of pressure. By coming along with the "some system" and opening stop-cocks to allow free vent, I was able to put the whole system on a new and more efficient basis.

The renewal of main pipe lines during the last four years of my regime to the extent of \$1,961 feet was also a very potent factor in improving the water system generally. These renewals, it must be noted, were all paid for from water revenue. There was also paid from surplus of 1918 the sum of \$35,000.00 to retire old Carleton water works and for which there was no sinking fund. Interest charges were reduced from \$78,976.22 in 1912 to \$77,893.46 in 1917, and this at a time when municipal and government departments were running wild with bond issues and spending money like water. As a careful provision for the future there was set aside in 1917 for sinking funds the sum of \$34,940.01, this being a decided increase over 1912, when the amount was \$25,551.33. Genoa was actually less in 1917 than in 1912, this in spite of the fact that more than 40,000 feet of new water mains

and about 25,000 feet of new main sewers were laid and 97 new hydrants installed. In the year 1918 alone sewerage and hydrant maintenance to amount of \$17,443.94 was charged to water revenue and I purchased and paid for this year, 34-inch cast iron pipe, extra valve castings and additions to plant costing together \$41,085.94, all without bond issue.

Now we come to the most interesting part. All this was done, not only without increase in taxation but on the other hand a very marked decrease. As a result of my administration, the water rate, which was recalled, was cut from one-fourth to one-fifth the assessed valuation, and this move saved the taxpayers \$15,000.00 in the year 1918.

At the same time I inaugurated a discount of ten per cent. on water taxes and the amount saved by those taking advantage was \$15,000.00. This discount rate has since been made five per cent., and I am perfectly confident that if the water and sewerage department is once more re-established on its old, efficient basis that a material reduction in taxation can be made for the benefit of all citizens.

As for Hydro, I think I made my position clear at the first meeting addressed by civic candidates in the Knights of Pythias Hall, and I stand for Civic Distribution without equivocation.

I wish to thank again those who voted for me at the primaries, and it is very encouraging to find that my record has not been forgotten after being out of civic life—and for a good many years. I was able to put the whole system on a new and more efficient basis.

FROM SHERLOCK HOLMES TO SPIRITS

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, creator of Sherlock Holmes, but now a sincere believer in things spiritual, arrived recently in St. John, N.B., as an Associated Press despatch.

"I propose to make a raid on American skepticism," he said, in explaining the purpose of his proposed lecture tour. "I propose to raid church and laity alike." Sir Arthur declared he had "learned the truth" and "Sherlock Holmes, however interesting and valuable as a friend, has no place in my life now."

Sir Arthur, his wife, and his three children were met at quarantine by William J. Burns, chief of the bureau of investigation of the Department of Justice. Mr. Burns said he was very much a materialist but went down the bay to greet the English visitor as "an old friend and a man who would have been a wonderful detective."

"Spiritualism today," said Sir Arthur, is nothing but religion. It's a greater religion than anything we have ever known. Fifty years from today this world is going to be a spiritual world, in which leaders of thought are going to laugh at our puny attempts to fathom the future.

"Spiritualism teaches a definite knowledge of the life after so-called death. It teaches us not to fear death and that the passing of heart beats is merely a promotion."

"You see, a so-called dead man goes to a happy plane. There is no crime, no sorrow and it is many, many times happier. You always have a difficult task proving to a man on this plane that he, not you, is really dead."

"But suppose a man passes who has been something of an unsavory individual here. Does he go to hell? No, he goes to a sort of hospital. That is a gray and a very unhappy, unpleasant sort of place. He must remain there, however, until his own voluntary acts show him fit for the other plane. It is simple and beautiful. But it is not materialistic."

Has Spoken With His Son.

"I have many times spoken with my son, 'Kingley' Conan Doyle," he continued, "but that is not strange. I wanted to talk to him, he wanted to talk to me. We talked. Kingley isn't dead, and it is interesting to know that from such seances the truth about the after life is becoming more and more apparent."

"Simplified Spiritualism is merely a great white truth of the Bible and religion. It is pristine purity of thought and action combined. There is nothing mysterious about it. It is clear and open. All you have to do is to think of the after death. Life of enviable beauty—and realize that there can be no fear of death because with Spiritualism you know exactly what is going to happen to you."

Sir Arthur calls himself a Theist, a believer in an infinite, omnipotent, omniscient God. His development in Spiritualism, he said, has taken thirty-six years. From the time he read a book written by the late Justice Edmunds of the Supreme Court of New York, which was printed in 1859. His intense interest in the subject dates from the death of his son, who was wounded in the war and died of pneumonia soon after the armistice.

The Doyle's will be in America three months. They will visit Philadelphia, Boston, Washington, St. Louis, Chicago and possibly other cities.

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PLAN TO BREAK UP UNIONISM IS APPARENT

National Civic Federation Warns Labor of Lenine—Foster O. B. U. Programme

New York, April 19.—The National Civic Federation has just issued a statement in which it warns that a definite and organized effort is under way to break up the American Labor Movement and to capture the American Federation of Labor and the railroad labor unions as preliminaries to the establishment of a "Workers Republic" in the United States in what is known as the Lenine-Foster program. The Federation asserts that William Z. Foster, well-known labor circles, is back of the movement and that propaganda to further it is being circulated through the medium of the Trade Union Educational League of Chicago.

Foster's plan for revolutionizing the labor movement through the formation of one big union is described by the Federation as the most scientific and plausible yet evolved on paper. It contemplates the selection of 1000 disaffected union men in as many localities to act as "key men" and round up brother "rebels." After that the "boring in" process advocated by Foster during the steel strike of 1919 is to be begun.

At a meeting last week of the Chicago Federation of Labor, Samuel Gompers charged openly that back of Foster's support of the One Big Union movement was propaganda of radical revolution to overthrow the constituted Government of the United States. "To do that," Mr. Gompers said, "Lenine has said that the American Federation of Labor must be overthrown."

The National Civic Federation in broadcasting Foster's literature and his "Call to Action," published last month in the Labor Herald, says that the legitimate trade unions will be less likely to reply to the propaganda by throwing out all Foster "key men" as fast as they appear.

The true significance of the Lenine-Foster move, says the Federation, "lies in its revelation of the real Bolshevik attitude toward American industrialists, thus serving notice on all good citizens to be prepared to resist this malevolent influence at any and every point."
