Mr. Basford: I have completed my consideration of the matter, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Hees: On a point of order, Mr. Speaker, the minister insists on making statements which have no basis whatsoever in fact, and is deceiving the house.

FISHERIES

D.D.T. IN GREAT LAKES-CONDITION OF CATCH

Mr. P. B. Rynard (Simcoe North): Mr. Speaker, I would like to direct a question to the Minister of Fisheries and Forestry. In view of the alarming d.d.t. levels found in fish in Lake Michigan, will the minister state if this condition exists in fish taken from Canadian waters?

Hon. Jack Davis (Minister of Fisheries and Forestry): Mr. Speaker, I made some inquiries through our departmental officials about d.d.t. levels in fish caught in the Great Lakes. I am told that the samples tested are well below the level of five parts per million, accepted by the United States Food and Drug Directorate. In practically all instances the residue has been less than two parts per million, and on the average less than one part per million.

Mr. Trudeau: I would have to defer to the minister responsible for this agency to answer that question.
