

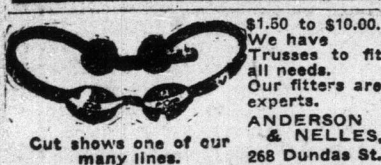

TROTZKY OFFERS BIG REWARD FOR LEADER'S BODY

Will Give Five Million Rubles For Koslovsky Dead or Alive.

WARSAW, March 11.—Leon Trotzky, the Russian Soviet war minister, according to Russians here who are in daily touch with their country, has offered a reward of 5,000,000 rubles for the body, dead or alive, of Gen. Koslovsky, the revolutionary leader in the Petrograd region.
General Koslovsky, in return, is reported to have offered ten million rubles for Trotsky's body.
It is reported here that a million rubles now is worth about \$50.
A dozen more assassinations are in progress throughout Russia, say the local Russians, who assert they are ending confidence of the ultimate success of the counter-revolutionary movement as they fear of fresh anti-Soviet forces appearing from Odessa northwestward.

NO FRICTION EXISTS BETWEEN DRY FORCES

Referendum Committee and Dominion Alliance Are Working Together.

TORONTO, March 11.—In a statement handed to the press tonight, following conferences between Rev. Dr. Andrew S. Grant, secretary of the Ontario Referendum Committee, and Rev. H. Spence, secretary of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance, it is declared that no friction exists between the two temperance organizations in connection with the referendum campaign.

The statement says that though there is no organic union between the two, there is a definite understanding, and both have the one object in view—to try to get the largest possible affirmative vote on the referendum question on 18th April next. Each organization will act independently, and will avoid overlapping.

According to the statement, the county and local organizations which worked in the referendum campaign of 1919 are again available, and are now practically complete in every electoral district in the Province of Ontario.

MUST STAND TRIAL ON ROBBERY CHARGE

BRANTFORD, March 11.—Raffaello Vitale and Raffaele Rossi, two young Italians who are alleged to have robbed a fellow countryman of \$1,400 yesterday, appeared in police court today and pleaded not guilty. They were sent up for trial by jury at the next assizes.

The salary of County Engineer Allan Jackson was increased by the county today from \$2,000 to \$2,500. Engineer Jackson has agreed to fill his position for the next three years.

SEES SWEEPING OF DICTATORSHIP IN RUSSIA SOON

Kerensky Predicts That People Will End Reign of Terror.

LONDON, March 11.—Russia today is in the beginning phase of upheaval which will have essentially the same result as the memorable occurrence of March 12, 1917, said Alexander F. Kerensky, Russia's former "man of destiny," today.

The fundamental causes of the outbreak in Russia, Kerensky declared, "are the same as those which brought about the first revolution just four years ago, and the outcome inevitably will be the same—the overthrow of the dictatorship."

"To the Russian working masses and the peasantry," Kerensky continued, "Socialism and Bolshevism are indistinguishable—both of them are terrors which must be ended."

IS NON-POLITICAL.
LONDON, March 11.—The leaders of the revolutionary movement now developing in Russia are entirely unknown in Russian political circles, which indicates that the movement is non-political and one of the broad masses of the Russian people, according to Anatoly Bakaloff, president of a group of Russian social democrats in London.

M. Bakaloff today communicated to British labor leaders important information which has filtered into Russian political and commercial circles in London. The source of the information is a "most reliable" source of information in Russia.

Sumner of the Soviet Government that the movement is directed by White counter-revolutionary elements are entirely false," declared M. Bakaloff, in his communication to the labor leaders.

Movement Spreading.
The revolution is being carried on by workers, sailors, soldiers and peasants. The Socialist parties are not even indirectly responsible. The movement is concentrated in Petrograd, but already is spreading through the country.

"We have reliable information that the garrisons of Pskov and Smolensk have revolted," he said. "In Pskov, 130 miles south, 57 miles south and 63 miles southwest of Moscow) the workers have expelled the commissars and proclaimed a general strike, and that the peasants of the Ukraine, Western Siberia and the Ural are in open revolt."

"Moscow, where the most reliable soviet troops are concentrated, now is quiet, but only by military force can the authorities prevent the Moscow workers from joining the revolutionaries."

FIVE TODIE FOR TREASON
Young Sinn Feiners Took Part in Recent Ambuscade.

DUBLIN, March 11.—Five young men, Bernard Ryan, Patrick Boyle, Thomas Ryan, Frank Flood and Dermott O'Sullivan, have been sentenced to death by hanging by a court-martial after conviction of high treason in carrying on war against the King. The trials were connected with the ambuscade at Drumcondra in February. The victory has commuted the sentence of O'Sullivan to life servitude on account of his youth. O'Sullivan is only 17 years old.

POLICEMEN SHOT.
BELFAST, March 11.—Three auxiliary policemen from the Gormanshow depot in Dublin, used for British troops, were shot outside a music hall here this evening while conversing with several young women. The group of men who did the shooting were not identified after their admission to a hospital. A civilian also was wounded during the shooting.

SALESMAN IS DUCKED.
DUBLIN, March 11.—Pedestrians proceeding to their homes this evening witnessed an unusual sight. He was taken from the machine, dipped twice in the water, and then tied to a post, from which spectators later released him.

The ducking of the salesman is said to have been only one incident of the campaign of the "Irish Republican Army" against the British. The Irish Republican Army Association has just been formed in the last fortnight. In the last fortnight dozens of freight depots and business houses have been raided with the purpose of securing books to show Belfast trade connections with Dublin.

SEVERE STORM SWEEPS SOUTH

Many Reported Injured and Much Damage Done in Louisiana.

SHREVEPORT, La., March 11.—It is reported that a severe storm struck Homer, Louisiana, and vicinity today, demolishing fifty or more derricks and an oil derrick in the Clairborne parish oil field, killing one woman and injuring twenty other persons.

MANY ARE INJURED.
RULEVILLE, Miss., March 11.—Several persons are reported seriously injured and many buildings demolished by a severe storm which struck Doddsville, near here, late today. All wires are down and the extent of the damage is unknown.

LABORERS' WAGES WILL BE REDUCED

ST. LOUIS, March 11.—The Washab Railroad today issued an announcement that notice of a proposal to reduce wages next month has been served on 3,500 unskilled laborers.

MAKING BIG CUT.
ST. PAUL, Minn., March 11.—Wages reductions ranging from 40c to 60c on a minimum of 25c are contemplated for unskilled laborers. The bulk of the cut will be in the range of 40c to 50c, and Great Northern, it was alleged, late today.

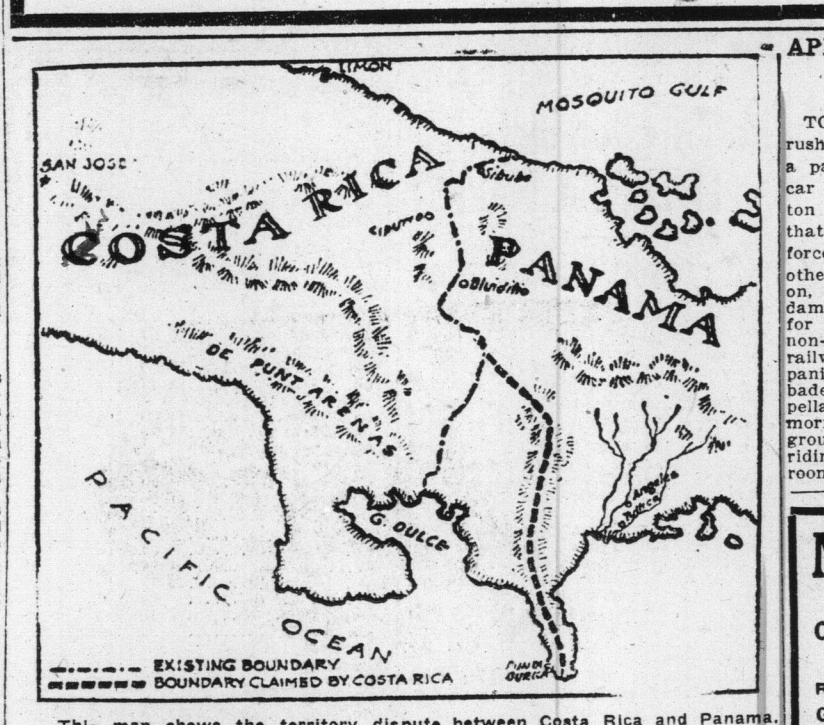
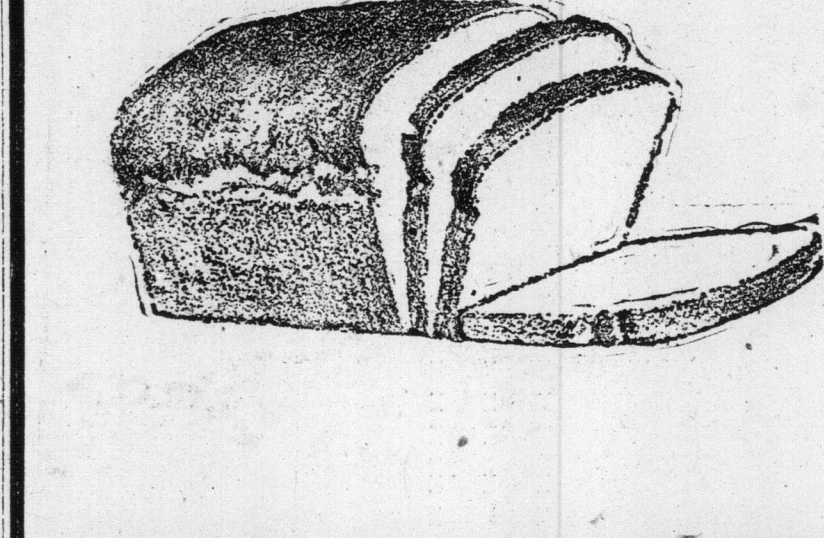

300 FREIGHT CARS TO CARRY BERRIES

Will Be Required To Move British Columbia 1921 Crop.

WINNIPEG, March 11.—It will take about 300 freight cars to move the 1921 British Columbia berry crop, if present estimates of the British Columbia Berry Growers' Association turn out to be correct. This means a production of 2,500 tons of small fruits for the year.

Owing to their bulk a freight car will only handle about six tons of small fruits. The British Columbia Berry Growers' Association has just been formed to do for berries what the Okanagan United Growers have done for apples and other tree fruits. It is made up of nine of the thirteen co-operative berry marketing organizations at present existing. The other four are expected to come in shortly.

"Increased production has made this organization necessary," stated R. A. McNaughton of Gordon Head, Vancouver Island, sales manager of the new association, who is in Winnipeg.

"Our production will this year be over 50 per cent greater than last year, when the crop brought in \$1,000,000. The berry crop under cultivation will amount of 2,800 acres this season. The members of the association are enthusiastic over the organization's prospects."

Will Enlarge Market.
The new association will endeavor to enlarge the market for British Columbia berries. In the past the bulk of the crop has been shipped to the prairies as fresh fruit. It is probable it will be exploited and enlarged wherever possible. An increasing quantity will be turned over to the factories to be made into jam.

SUSSEX, N.B., CHAMPS.
MONCTON, N.B., March 11.—Sussex won the amateur hockey championship of New Brunswick here tonight by defeating the Chatham team, 8 to 5. Sussex, all the way, Sussex are the champions of the eastern amateur league, and Chatham were the winners of the northern New Brunswick league.

APPELLATE COURT ALLOWS DAMAGES

TORONTO, March 11.—During the rush hour of April 28, 1920, Fred Kine, a painter, boarded a Hamilton Radial car at Hamilton on his way to Hamilton Beach. The car was so crowded that he could not get inside, and was forced to stand on the platform. Another car bumped into the car he was on, and he was injured. He sued for damages and the jury returned a verdict for \$350. The trial judge, however, non-suited him on the ground that the railway act relieved of liability companies which posted notices which forbade riding on the platforms. The appellate division at Osgoode Hall this morning allowed Kine's appeal on the ground that the notice only put into operation by the duke's death, late in February, too serious to permit her to be informed of it.

EMPRESS AGAIN IN CRITICAL CONDITION

DOORN, Holland, March 11.—When former Empress Augusta Victoria of Germany was apprised today of the death of her brother, Duke Ernst Günther of Schleswig-Holstein, she suffered another severe heart attack. The physicians attending the former empress considered her condition at the time of the duke's death, late in February, too serious to permit her to be informed of it.

SITUATION IS IMPROVED.
MONTREAL, March 11.—The situation in the building trades took a favorable turn today, and it is now probable that the difficulty in regard to the proposed wage cut of from 15 to 25 per cent put into operation by the General Contractors' Association will be settled amicably.

Canada May Lose Six Nations Indians

SYRACUSE, N. Y., March 11.—More than 8,600 Iroquois of the Six Nations, residents of the Brant grant in Western Ontario, determined to resist compulsory citizenship in Canada, have asked Dr. E. A. Bates of this city, an adopted chief, to appeal to President Harding for asylum in Indian reserves in New York State.

A great council meeting of the chiefs of the Six Nations will be held this week at the Onondaga reservation to outline a plan of action. The Indians, it is claimed, have been ordered to take out citizenship papers in the Johnston within thirty days. The situation may bring to a head the long-continued negotiations between the Indians, the State and Federal Government as to the future of the tribes in the United States.

JUNK DEALERS ARE THREATENED WITH RUIN

TORONTO, March 11.—Junk dealers in this city are said to be threatened with ruin, as a result of the bottom having dropped out of the junk business. The dealer today estimated that about \$4,000,000 worth of junk of every description is heaped up in yards in this city and cannot be sold. Within a few weeks the price of rags has dropped from 8c a pound to 3c; newspapers from \$1.10 per cwt to 25c; and whiskey bottles from 4c a piece to 1c.

GUNMAN CAPTURED AFTER HOT FIGHT

BRAMPTON, March 11.—A gunman was caught rifling the till of the Queen's hotel here early this morning. He had secured \$12, and after having been pursued through the streets by Richard Robson, hotel proprietor, the sheriff, policemen and about 200 citizens, and exchanging shots with Robson without any person being hurt, he was captured at the Grand Trunk railway station. He said he came from Orangeville, Ontario, and that his name was May.
