At the outbreak of the war Germany had in commission or building between thirty and forty submarines. Since that time it is estimated that she has probably built more than 200 new boats, possibly 250, certainly not 300.

Count von Bulow recently claimed that Germany had 220 submarine units in service. This is undoubted by the counsel of high hope rather than fact. The submarine has not a long life, and in the beginning at least, merely in their manoeuvering, the submarine met with many disasters. It is not improbable that since the war at least 100 and possible 150 German U-boats have been accounted for—a few captured, a considerable number sunk by mine, net or accident, or scrapped.

So, at a conservative estimate, it is probable that Germany has not many more than 150 submarines in service, and the number may be actually less. But, on the other hand, these boats are larger, stronger, and increasingly more effective than those which have been put out of business. No one, perhaps, outside of Germany has any reliable knowledge as to just how fast new boats are being turned out. It is almost certain that it is not less than one
