Sir Charles Alexander Harris, who enters upon his sixty-fifth year today has been governor and commander in-chief of Newfoundland since December 1917. Sir For more than ten years he was chief clerk of the Colonial Office in London. Previously he was private secretary to two successive undersecretaries for the col-A few years after entering the Colonial Office he acted as secretary to the West India Royal Commission and spent a year in the West Indies. He also acted as assistant secretary to the international conference on sugar bountles. In 1899 he prepared the case for the Government in the Venezuela boundary dispute. He also conducted the case in connection with the Brazalian boundary and for his services was created Commander of the Order of the Bath.
