Ottawa, December 7, 1917.

Sir,-

In reply to your letter of the 50th ultime asking for information as to the position of the Stony Indians in regard to the Same Laws of the Province of Alberta, I beg to say that so far as the treaty made with the Indians mentioned in regard to this matter is concerned the agreement entered into with them on the 22md September 1877, reads as follows:-

"Her Majesty the Queen hereby agrees with her said
"Indians, that they shall have right to pursue their vocations
"of hunting throughout the tract surrendered as heretofore
"described, subject to such regulations as may from time to
"time be made by the Government of the country, acting under
"the authority of Her Majesty, and saving and excepting such
"tracts as may be required or taken up from time to time for
"esttlement, mining, trading or other purposes by the Government
"of Canada, or by any of Her Majesty's subjects duly authorized
"therefor by the said Government,"

It will be seen therefore, that the right of the Indians to hunt was granted subject to such laws as might be enacted relating to the matter.

Owing to numerous complaints being received against the Stony Indians of destruction by them of game, it was considered advisable to bring them under the provisions of the Game Laws of the them North West Territories from the lat. Jan'y, 1895. This action was taken under the terms of the Indian Act, as enacted by 55 Vict. Chap. 185, which provided that
