- mer resident in all wooded sections. Arrives April 15; departs October 20.
- 117. Short-eared Owl, Marsh-owl. Asio flammeus. Common summer resident in all marshy and prairie sections. Arrives April 1; departs October 30.
- 118. Barred Owl. Strix varia. Summer resident of the wooded sections. The records show it to be more widely differed than was once believed. In 1886 I saw a specimen taken at Kenora. In my collection is one taken at Winnipeg, March 30, 1906, by Harry Jones. E. W. Darbey writes me that he had four, taken at Winnipeg in 1906, and one early in April, 1908. At Portage la Prairie I was shown a female taken by G. E. Atkinson, May 19, 1899. Charleson writes me that on May 9, 1901, while canoeing up the Assiniboine near Winnipeg, he saw a Barred Owl in a tree. Also he secured a specimen from Riding Mountain in January, 1905; it was killed by T. S. Kittson, and had in its stomach a flying squirrel. Arrives about April 1; departs about November 1.
- 119. Great Gray Owl. Scotiaptex nebulosa. One specimen, taken on the Big Plain, September 29, 1884. Rather common along the Red River, and resident in the woods about Lake Winnipeg.
- 120. Richardson Owl. Glaux funerea richardsoni. A common winter visitant in the Alleghanian region, but probably resident and breeding in the Canadian part of the Province.
- 121. Saw-whet Owl. Glaux acadica. Rare, but apparently a permanent resident.
- 122. Western Horned Owl. Bubo virginianus pallescens. Common resident wherever there is woods.
- 122a. White Horned Owl. Bubo virginianus subarcticus.
