

good barometer of trade, and if this be true, conditions must be satisfactory, for the great iron mills of the country are running to their fullest capacity, with orders three and six months ahead at present high prices. Railroad earnings are excellent. The percentages of grain are not quite so large as last year, but this is hot to be expected, and certainly cannot be construed as a bearish feature. Congress opens in about a month and the prospects are that we shall have little disturbing legislation. The nation is busy and contented, and the party in power will be disposed to let well enough alone and occupy itself chiefly with international affairs, such as the Isthmian Canal, Cuba, etc. Upon the question of tariff, reciprocity, currency and trusts there may be some talk, but little action. It is in periods of idleness and discontent that we look for interference with busines at Washington. The future of the market seems somewhat confused, It is bright in spots and clouded in others, and seems likely to continue irregular, with no pronounced changes either direction, until the leaders in the various deals who have stocks to sell get ready to give prices another lift. There will be plenty of money to invest this winter, and good securities are exceedingly scarce, recent offerings being promptly taken. This is one of the most encouraging features of the entire situation.

QUEER CREATURES THAT AMUSE AND INTEREST THE TRAVELER.

Insects, Birds and Reptiles Found In the Sand-Funny Freaks of the Tarantula Hawk and the Road Runner-Worrying a Rattler. There's plenty of life on the desert-

If the hairy ogre gets caught out a great way from his castle, his name is Dennis, and he knows it. He flops over upon his back to make a fight, and if he could get hold of the hawk in that position he would make short work of the little chap, but the hawk sees the trick and just keeps salling around and watching for an opening, and when he catches the spider off his guard he darts in, hits him a lick and gets away like a flash.

Sometimes the hawk will pretend to quit and fly away, but the instant the tarantula is on his feet and scooting for shelter whiz! comes the hawk like a bullet and socks it to him in the back of the head. A few stings like that do up the tarantula. He seems to become dizzy from the poison, staggers a few steps and collapses in a hairy heap. His legs twitch a few times, and that is the end of his marvelous career.

I've been calling the hawk "he" all along, but it isn't that kind of a bird.

The tarantula Nemesis is the female hawk, so far as I can judge, because after the spider is knocked out the hawk proceeds to deposit eggs in the remains, and I suppose the eggs are hatched by the heat of decomposition. Possibly the purpose of laying eggs in a defunct tarantula is to provide the young hawks with grub at the threshold of life, so to speak. Whatever the scheme may be, it is death to the tarantula, and for that reason nobody ever harms a tarantula hawk. The insect's sting is said to be poisonous to men, but I never knew one

One of them had struck the snake with his sharp bill and the diamond back had promptly coiled himself in a defensive attitude and was springing his rattle wickedly. One of the birds remained lear the snake, jumping about and making a great show of hostility, but keep-ing beyond reach all the time, while the other gathered little bunches of dry cactus, with spines as sharp as need almost as hard, which he dropped close

to the reptile. The road runner was as busy as the The road runner was as busy as the old boy in a gale of wind, and in a few minutes he had piled a regular little corral of cactus spines all around the rattlesnake. Then the pair of them began to tantalize the snake, and flying at him they provoked him into striking at them, with results disastrous to himself, for every time he launched ant he hit for every time he launched out he hit into the cactus and got stuck full of the

When the rattlesnake had just about got crazy and was reckless of his guard, the road runners flew up, hovered over him and darted down at him whenever they saw a good chance to hit him. Their sharp bills did great execution, and it wasn't long before they had the rattle-snake laid out as cold as a wedge. They are great generals, these road runners, and they always get away with the rattlesnake. That's why nobody ever shoots a road runner in California.—Ex-
