### TRADING STAMPS BECOMING UN-POPULAR.

On New Year's Day, owing to local municipal enactments, trading stamps were thrown out of business in Toronto, Brantford, Woodstock and St. Thomas. The Dominion Trading Stamp Co. have accordingly closed their doors in these places, pending trial of their appeal to the courts against the various enactments, which are based on a permissive Act of the Ontario Legislature. The company's circulars issued in the above cities express hope of being allowed to resume business shortly. In Brantford the grocers and butchers some time ago signed an agreement that independent of any action of the law, they would not use trading stamps, premium tickets and all similar devices after Dec. 31st, 1901. Almost all the other merchants in the city have signed an agreement not to use trading stamps. No matter what the decision of the law courts is, it will not affect matters in Brantford, as the merchants have almost to a unit voluntarily agreed to do away with such devices in their business.—Stratford Herald.

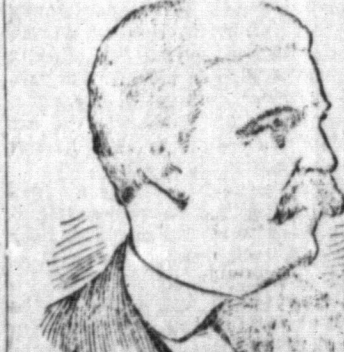
## DREAD DEEDS

### Drunken Indian Terrorized Inhabitants of Village—Tortured his Wife.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., January 6.—A horrible atrocity, which will likely result in death, was perpetrated last night at Garden River, a Canadian Indian reservation, twelve miles from here. Joseph Buzenaw, a half-breed, loaded up with firewater, went on a rampage, terrorizing half the inhabitants of the village and wound up at home. He gave his wife a terrible beating, and then burned her side and face with a red hot iron.

The woman, shrieking with agony, managed to escape from the house, crawling on her hands and knees. She had not gone far when the drink-crazed brute followed her with an ax and tried to chop off her head, but was prevented from striking more than one blow by his sister-in-law and other help, which arrived. The woman had received a glancing cut from the ax and was picked up senseless and covered with blood. Buzenaw was taken to the town hall, where he was locked up.

Soon after he broke down the door and again went to his home, where he attempted to cut his wife's throat with a butcher's knife. He was fought off by attendants, and then escaped across the river to Sugar Island, an American territory, where he is supposed to be wandering in the woods. An armed party is after him. It is said Buzenaw's wife cannot live.
