Action For Damages Dismissed.

The action for damages brought against the Tp. of Bruce by Roderick M. Young, a Commercial traveler of Hamilton, was dismissed by Judge Barrett here on Friday last. Young, it seems, had several ligaments in his right shoulder torn and his nerves generally shaken up as the result of being thrown from the stage which upset over a culvert a half mile north of Underwood on Dec. 8th, 1900. The complaint was that there was no guard or railing on the culvert, and that the accident was caused in consequence. As the act, however, requires in such cases that proper notice must be given the Council within thirty days of any such mishap, and as it appeared from the evidence adduced here on Friday that Young had merely informed the Council of the injuries he had received, but had failed to notify them of the exact spot where the accident occurred, the Judge held that the plaintiff had not given sufficient notice within the prescribed time, and the action was accordingly dismissed with costs. Col. Scott for plaintiff, D. Robertson for defendant.

Blacksmiths Organizing.

Over 5000 blacksmiths doing business throughout the Province of Ontario have organized and will apply at the next session of the Legislature for incorporation as an association. They will ask power to compel all blacksmiths who shoe horses to pass an examination. Efforts have been made this year to form an organization and the idea has received the approval of all the local tradesmen.

A "Spotter" Spotted.

Last week a gentleman purporting to be a Conservative organizer struck town and after registering at an hotel whose management is hardly of the fame political stripe as a Conservative organizer should patronize, proceeded to make himself a hale fellow well-met. He succeeded pretty well in this and the knowing ones made him feel at home. For a while he was in great demand, and things worked along fine until a telephone message alleged that the would-be organizer was none other than the chief spotter for the men who travel from place to place and trap hotel-men in the local option towns. As soon as this information came to hand the organizer was taken into quiet side-talks by those who had previously made life one glorious round of pleasure for him, and the question was put to him straight. He as straightly denied the charge and to prove that he was the real goods exhibited some papers showing that he bought hay as a side-line. When told that Conservative organizers very seldom used hay as a side-line, he excused it by saying it was only to assist some United States friends. Whether he was just doing this until Reciprocity is put through is not known, but the hay incident made local Conservatives more suspicious. Owing to his varied stories Mr. Organizer had a hard time to get any one to even talk about the weather on Saturday night and Sunday, and he vomited the burg by stage Monday morning, neglecting, it is reported, to settle with his Reform host, who had so carefully looked after his wants. Although he promised to be back the same evening and "square" himself, he has not been here since.—Port Elgin Times.

WALKERTON.

A Brantford auto which was touring through this section last week was responsible for an accident west of Walkerton in which Mrs. Jos. Condy of Brant was badly shaken up. At the time of the mishap, Mrs. Condy was on her way to Walkerton, and when near the farm of Mr. Oliver McConnell, the Brantford auto came puffing along and scared her horse, which plunged into the ditch and upset the buggy, dumping her heavily onto the ground, where she was afterwards discovered in a badly bruised and shaken-up condition. The auto, we understand, continued on its way in blissful ignorance of the mishap.

A quartette composed of Jacob Bohford, Fred Cords, John Livingston and Ed. Sinkfeld, all of Elmwood, were arraigned before Magistrate McNamara here on Tuesday charged with assaulting Wm. Liefso at Elmwood on the evening of July 12th. The complaint was laid by Liefso, who claims to have been the victim of a very severe pomelling. At the trial, it seems, a lot of conflicting evidence was adduced but after hearing the testimony the Magistrate levied a fine of a dollar and costs on each of the quartette.

Constables Ward and Hull of Warton brought 4 prisoners to the jail last Thursday. Henry Bateman bought a bottle of whisky for an Indian and was fined \$50 and costs or 80 days. His fine was paid and he was released on the 14th. John B. Taylor the Indian who got the bottle of whisky got 10 days. Jos. Elliott another Indian was drunk and got 30 days. Robt. Fraser, a machinist of Toronto was also drunk and got 70 days.

Jack Burke, who was fined \$10.00 and costs some weeks ago for being drunk while on the Indian List and who was given thirty days to raise the coin, failed to cash up within the prescribed time, and a warrant, we understand, has been issued for his arrest. Burke is reported to have left town.

Damage To Fruit Crop.

Niagara Falls, Ont. July 24.—Damage that will foot to thousands and thousands of dollars was caused in the fruit belt of Niagara by to-day's high winds. Some say \$100,000 will not cover the damage. Fruit and vegetables were the chief sufferers, while trees were uprooted and branches were torn from trunks, spoiling many beautiful shade trees. In some places it is estimated that from 5 to 10 per cent. of the peach crop was threshed from the branches, and from 10 to 20 per cent. of the pear crop is now on the ground. Fruit growers along the Niagara River declare the loss to be fully a third of the crop of early apples, and from 10 to 13 per cent. of the Fall and Winter varieties. T. G. Bell, a well-known fruit grower, of St. David's estimates his peach loss to be about 10 per cent., and said that about double this amount of pears had been threshed off the trees. Grapes suffered some, he thought, but not materially.

Items of Interest

George Robson, a farmer living on the lake shore near Leamington, does not depend entirely on his brawny muscles to make money. He has a head and uses it. Mr. Robson conceived the idea of coralling the large schools of much abused German carp which make journeys up Sturgeon Creek, that courses through a section of his farm. A barricade of stakes was put across the creek's mouth and the marauders were trapped. Since then the active farmer has seized and emptied his catch in the stronghold. Last week he filled an order from a New York firm for seven tons, netting him a harvest of \$350. This shipment scarcely made a showing in the writhing mass of yellow pillagers.

A G. T. R. locomotive ran amuck at Owen Sound the other day and got wrecked after telescoping a freight car and derailing two others. It was Mogul No. 2491 and was at the water tank near the round house. One of the attendants went aboard to move the locomotive down the track a short distance. It is said that he threw the throttle wide open and that when he went to shut it off became confused and found that he could not stop the engine. He jumped before she had gone far and the big locomotive went down the yard increasing her speed every second. When opposite the wharf freight sheds she crashed into a string of cars.

Now that the United States battleship the Maine has been raised, it is clearly proven that the Spaniards did not destroy the vessel, but that she was rent to pieces by an explosion from her own magazines. Yet the supposition that Spain did it, led to the Spanish war, and secured Cuba for the United States. Nations as well as individuals suffer from injustice founded on mere supposition. The truth now known in this case should be a standing warning to the United States (and other nations) not to rush into war for imaginary causes, or at the dictation of yellow journals and unprincipled men who hope to profit by the blood of others. "Remember the Maine" should now have a very different meaning from what it had during the war.


