FOR BETTER GAME LAWS.

The committee appointed last Feb ruary by the North American Fish and Game Pretection Association for the purpose of harmonizing the fish and game laws of the various provinces of Canada met in Montreal last week. Representatives were present from Quebec, Ontario, New Brunswick, Vermont and New York. The inland representative is Dr. C. A. McCallum, of Dunnville, Ont. The chief object of the meeting was to have uniformity of laws in the various game countries, and also to arrange for the punishment of offenders against the laws.

A number of important resolutions were adopted. It was decided to recommend to the Governments of the various provinces and states that the open season for moose, cariboo and red deer shill be from Sept. 15th to Nov. 15th, and that in the provinces and states where the supply is decireasing, the open season should be made shorter, or prohibited altogether. It was also decided to recommend that each hunter should be restricted to one moose, one cariboo and two deer during the mose who is the country and has been due who is to newspaper ing each season. It was further de cided to recommend that spring shoot ing of game birds should be abolished and the open season made from Sept 15th to Dec. 31st.

The committee, at the conclusion of its labors, will report back to the Executive Committee, and all the various fish and game protective associations will be informed of the findings of the committee.

A NEWSPAPER TRUST.

Nothing appears too big or too extravagant for the "trust" idea, says the Montreal Witness, but people may well ask, "What next?" when they learn that a newspaper trust is in process of formation in London, with a view of controlling several large weeklies, as well as morning and evening dailies in the great metropolis. This trust is alleged to have five million pounds capital, and expects to begin operations with the new year. Theoretically it is easy to imagine what an immense power such an organization might wield over public opinion, but as the established character of a newspaper is the best claim it possesses on the confidence and attention of the public, the trust would probably discover that its power to mould or lead public opinion was lost by the fact that it was a trust. There are papers with large circulations as advertising sheets and having well-served news-columns, but whose editorial utterances are never taken seriously by anytody. A newspaper to have any real weight with the public must enjoy public respect, and that is only secured by consistent devotion to right ideals. The public looks to the newspapers for the expression of its best thought, and when these fail in that they lose power. A trust would enforce unity of sentiment and purpose in all its organs, and, should the financial or other interests of the trust conflict with public interests, the trust would soon discover that newspapers are not like steel rails, cotton and coal oil, to be made and managed as a monopoly.

CONKLING'S GREATEST EFFORT. Where the Famous Senator Made the Speech of His Life.

"The best political fighting is done in a convention where there is stubborn op-position," said an old delegate to many national gatherings. "The most effective oratory is heard where speakers realize oratory is heard where speakers realize that they must be convincing. The difference in the speeches of Conkling and Garfield in the Chicago convention was as marked as the personality of the men themselves. And yet undoubtedly each man caused intelligent and conservative delegates to halt in their opinions. Conkling, in nominating Grant, aroused the ling, in nominating Grant, aroused the convention and the galleries to the summit of enthusiasm. It seemed as if it could never be subdued. The speech of Carfield, in which he presented the name of Sherman, had, however, exactly that effect. It was necessary that it should be so in order to quiet the tumult started by Conkling.

"Great as Conkling's speech is con-ceded to have been, the convention and the galleries did not hear his greatest effort, and unfortunately there is no record of it. It was unwritten. The day before the ballot there was a meeting of the 306, as the Grant phalanx is known in political history. Some attempts had been made to break it. Strong overtures had been presented to several of the 306. The meeting to which I refer was held in a room under the roof of the hotel. We mer there acceptly. We were pledged We met there secretly. We were pledged to say nothing to others about our cau-It was a hot day, and a skylight was opened to admit air. Mr. Conkling got up to make his last talk to the 306 before they went to the convention. It was not a speech to convince those who There was no occasion for that. But it was intended as a warning against threatened combinations, and a reassertion of fealty to our candidate. Conkling was at his best, and I had seen

him under all circumstances.
"Jast as he was beginning there was a disturbance on the roof. A reporter who in inkling of the meeting had there and flattened himself so that he might hear the proceedings. A party of linemen on the roof at the same time, but ignorant of the meeting below or of the reporter's presence at the sky-light, came along, and the reporter, think-ing they were after him, skedaddled. It was this disturbance that caused Conkling to stop, and then the skylight was closed. The incident had no effect upon Conkling's effort, but it prevented the reporter from shorthanding what we all conceded to be a much greater effort than the one made by Conkling the night he placed Grant in nomination. I knew this placed Grant in nomination. I know this is saying a good deal, but I heard both, as did 305 others, and our opinion on the speech in the hotel room was unanimous. Several times a number of us asked Conkling to write the speech he made in the room, but he always replied that it couldn't be done: that it was an inspiration and that inspirations never repeated themselves.

Brougham's Joke.


