

THE T. & N. O. RAILWAY.

Third Section and An Extra Wire to Cobalt Authorized. Toronto, Dec. 21.-An order-in-council was passed yesterday authorizing the extension of the T. & N. O. Ry, from its present terminus to the junction with the G. T. P. This will be the third section of the road, and will be from 37 to 40 miles in length, from the junction of the Abitibi and Black rivers northward

rivers northward.

The second section, which is nearing completion, is 100 miles in length.

Hon. Mr. Matheson said yesterday that he expected the Government would finance the project, without further borrowing, out of the ordinary reserves.

We expect the Dominion subsidy, of course," he added.
