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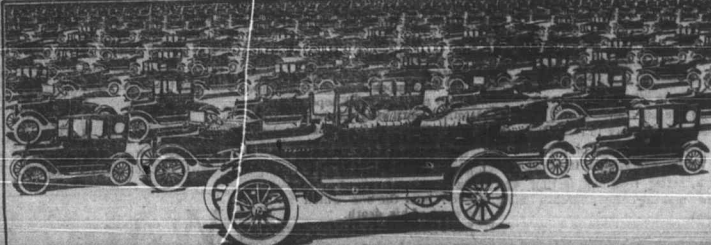

Important Notice to Farmers.
The annual meeting of the Kings County Farmers' Association, Mr. Geo. E. Pines, Mr. A. N. Griffin and Mr. H. Woodworth were appointed a committee to find out and report upon the fertilizer, seed and spray material situation. The finding of the committee is as follows:
Fertilizer and spray materials are scarce, and in order to be sure of obtaining what is required, orders should be placed at once. The price of these materials is advancing and this is due to the fact that the supply is being hoarded by placing your order now, not only will better prices than are possible later be obtained, but late orders may be difficult to fill at any price.
Dealers in these supplies are in a position to quote prices, which are as fixed as present as they will be, except that there will likely be a gradual advance, therefore, if your dealer is not in a position to quote prices, get them from the one who is. Get in touch with your nearest dealer at the earliest possible date.
The United Fruit Company have placed large orders for their members at a price much below prices ruling today, and in some lines these orders can be increased, as this was stipulated in the contracts. The Manager has stated to your Committee that he is prepared to handle orders up to the limit of possible purchases at old prices, at a price very little in advance of that given to members. Private farmers outside the Company place orders immediately. These orders to be placed through your nearest Fruit Company.
Ground limestone can be obtained by any farmer through their nearest Fruit Company. In car lots at \$3.00 per ton, or by Windsor, up to 50 miles 50 cents; to 50 miles 60 cents; to 75 miles 75 cents. Farmers not wishing a whole car combine in purchasing a car. Minimum carload weight 20 tons. We advise ordering now when cars are available and prices are good.
Government inspected, cleaned seed wheat can be obtained through the local Fruit Companies at the price of \$3.00 per bushel. Berwick, purchased by purchaser, if orders are placed at once.
Your Committee have made every effort to gain a full knowledge of the situation respecting the above, and would urge all farmers to make up their orders at once, otherwise disappointment is likely to result. The seed supply is limited, and it is not possible to supply a large quantity of seed. The fertilizers include mixed fertilizer, 3-10 and 4-10; Bone Meal, Acid Phosphate, Slag, Nitrate of Soda and Ground Limestone. The spray materials include stramonium, lead and arsenate of lime, bluestone, hydrated lime, lime sulphur and black wash.
Should any Fruit Company refuse to take orders, make the fact known to the undersigned.

Why We are at War.

A boy asked me the other day why this nation is at war. There may be many other boys who would like to stand up for their country in an argument, but who don't know clearly what to say. The usual arguments are so long and mixed that a boy gets confused. Therefore, for the benefit of the young folks who want to hold something in their minds that is simple and to the point, I will give the reasons why the United States is now at war with Germany.

1. Because we could not remain neutral. We tried to. We waited and waited. Many think we waited too long. We did not get into the war until our national existence was imperilled.
2. Because Germany broke her solemn treaty and invaded Belgium and attacked France without provocation. If she would do that there was no reason to suppose that she would not attempt to conquer us when she got ready.
3. Because the conduct of this war by the German Government has placed the Government army on level of savages, bandits or pirates, and enemies of the human race. It has violated all international law, all codes of chivalry, all dictates of humanity. We were bound to join the other nations in suppressing the German army, exactly as all good citizens would be bound to assist the police in overcoming a burglar.
4. Because no decent treaty-keeping civilized government on earth would be able with such unscrupulous power as the German Government unchained.
5. Because while we were still neutral the German Government had its spies busy among us, and was plotting with other nations against us.
6. Because the German Government has no conscience. It is governed not by a sense of right and wrong, as other nations, but solely by what is favorable or unfavorable to its own power. Other nations can not exist alongside such a nation, just as civilized, law-abiding citizens could not live in a community with criminals at large who were devoid of any moral restraint.
7. Because the German Government is an absolutism supported by militarism. So long as a monarchical organization flourishes no democracy is safe.
8. Because the German Government by its frightful injustice and cruelty in Belgium; by its attack on undefended towns in England contrary to all rules of civilized warfare; by its destruction by submarines of unarmed ships, and by its general brutality and inhumanity has shown itself to be the enemy not only of us but of civilization.
9. Because the German Government cannot possibly represent the German people. No populace is capable of such inhumanity as it has displayed; only kings and their cliques could

Prices for Potatoes Will Be Limited.

Higher prices for potatoes that have now prevailing will not be permitted. The food controller has sent notification to this effect to all wholesale handlers, stating that any attempt to secure higher prices will be dealt with promptly. If retail dealers should attempt to charge an unreasonable profit on potatoes the food controller is prepared to fix the margin of profit, if necessary, at six maximum per cent.

At the present time there is a total surplus in Canada over normal consumption of about 6,000,000 bushels of potatoes made up as follows:
Nova Scotia surplus, 1,000,000
Prince Edward Island surplus, 500,000
Western Prov. surplus, 1,000,000
Total, 2,500,000
Quebec surplus, 3,000,000
leaving a balance of 6,000,000 bushels total surplus for Canada.
Ontario is just about self-sufficient.

If potatoes are withheld from the market, for higher price in the spring, which the food controller says he will not allow, there will be a glut on the market and a surplus that will be wasted. Fearing this waste the food controller has decided that the price of potatoes must not advance; and in fact, the prices are at the present time falling and the trend of the market is toward still lower prices.

When the War Will End.

The Boston News Bureau, a paper edited by C. W. Barron, who spent a few months in Europe last year, has published the following prediction: "Those whose opinions are eagerly sought in the councils of finance are almost a unit in the declaration that this year, 1918, will witness the end of the great war. Some bolder prophets, backed by what they consider competent evidence, assert that within three months, peace parleys will have begun. Not since the war started has peace talk been so confident, and it seems not to be born of a wish father to the thought, but appears to be the result of searching analysis of economic conditions and knowledge of a general weakening in Germany not possessed by the general public. Sentiment in the highest sources is that when peace comes it will come suddenly."

"One man in a position to know something of the powers on the side of the struggle says that economically the European belligerents on both sides are near the cracking point."

"This man says the world may no longer dismiss from its mind all visions of a military victory; one which will decide the destinies of the war, is, in his mind, out of the question."

There is authority for the statement that the Kaiser sees the handwriting on the wall and has agreed to a constitutional form of government of the German Empire. Such a change might not occasion any serious change in the overthrow of the Hohenzollerns should the German people insist that the present Emperor should continue at the head of a truly representative government.

In such a compromise, it is said, President Wilson would acquiesce, provided of course adequate guarantees were given that the people of Germany were not an imperial dictator to be the real power behind the government.
