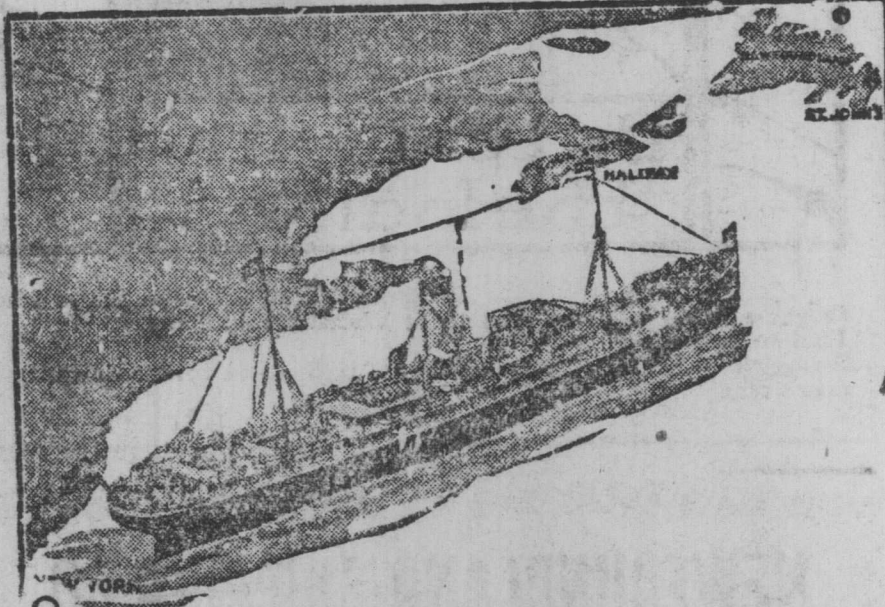

**LATEST**

LONDON, Dec. 31.—The Italian Embassy in a statement issued to-day regarding the suspension of payments by Banco Italiana D'sconto of Rome, said that the general ban only a partial moratorium had been granted and that the bank's trouble was due to causes not at all affecting other Italian banks which are functioning regularly.

DUBLIN, Dec. 31.—Resolutions favoring ratification of the Anglo-Irish Treaty were adopted to-day by the County Councils of Meath, Monaghan, and by the Limerick Chamber of Commerce.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Agreements reached to-day by the Naval Committee of the Arms Conference included the size and aggregate tonnage limitation of aircraft carriers and subject only to the French government's confirmation, the size and armament of auxiliary craft. This cleared the committee's decks pending replies from the French and Japanese governments on the Root resolution to initiate the banning entirely of submarine warfare against merchant vessels.

Lord Lee said he felt there was a misunderstanding in the French group as to the British attitude on the submarine question. Lord Lee then referred to an article written by the chief of an important bureau of the French naval staff designed to "throw ridicule on those who criticised German methods in the late war." Lord Lee stated that the way of disavowal by the French of any intention of attacking their late comrade in arms was in the adoption of the Root resolution number two, banning submarine warfare against merchant vessels. Admiral De Bon, for the French naval staff, declared emphatically that "there is nothing more foreign to our minds than the idea of attacking a friend." Admiral De Bon formally repudiated the article in question declaring that it in no way represented the views of the French navy as to the use of submarines. M. S. Sarraout, head of the French delegation, offered the French government's formal repudiation of the methods of warfare of German submarines. He deplored the bitter press campaign of criticisms of the motives of France and denounced the suggestions that France harboured imperialist designs or plans of "aggression against those who have mingled their blood with ours in the greatest war of history."

**Confusion Ensues When Lights Go Out**

General confusion ensued last night when the electric lights on streets, in stores, theatres and dwelling houses suddenly went out, leaving everything in complete darkness.

The condition of the streets which were ice-covered as they had not been at any time during the season, added to the difficulties of pedestrians and many people sustained bad falls, though no serious injury to anyone was reported.

The lights were out all night but the damage to the plant at Petty Hr. was sufficiently repaired by 10 o'clock to-day to give the city a current temporarily.

**Woman For Sale Keeping**

A middle-aged woman of the higher levels was found by the police in the West End last night acting in a strange manner. It was decided to take her into custody and an officer brought her to the lock-up where she spent the night. On going before the Judge this morning she was discharged.

**Herring Fishery Over**

The following schooners have sailed from Wood's Isld. with herring cargoes: Marion Mosher for Halifax, 700 bbls.; Aviator for Gloucester, 452 bbls. Scotch and 1677 bbls. pickled. A message to the Customs Dept. says that these are the last sailing for the season, and adds that the fishery is now over the herring are very plentiful and weather fine.
