HARTLAND GIRL IN SALONIKI

In a letter to her mother from Saloniki, Miss Ethel Boyer, nursing sister says:

I have had such a busy day, and am so tired to-night. Am in the officers' ward, really the nicest place in the whole hospital. It is so clean, and of course the men are all gentlemen, but it is hard, they expect the same as if they were in a civil hospital. There are ten hundred and forty beds in this hospital, and it is astonishing how some of the wards are fitted up. They make all sorts of things out of tin boxes, soap boxes—nothing is wasted. For dippers we use tin cans with a stick in the side; lanterns lighting, candles are used, but they cost too much, one only lasts an evening, and besides they are hard to get. We are really very "comfy" now; four sisters to a tent. Have a bed in each corner, a screen in the centre, tea table in front. One must have tea even on active service. In front of my window stands my dressing table, a mirror hangs over that; have a dear little stove. The days are simply lovely, bright sunshine, but the nights are cool—a change after 4 p. m. It is lovely to think summer is coming. There is always something to be thankful for, mother. All the girls look so well since coming here, but it is real active service. Sugar is getting very scarce; no milk now. Almost everything is very expensive. Coal is only \$60 a ton.

What a happy time it will be when I get back home. It may be some time yet, but as long as I keep well I want to stay. I would not be happy home. I want to see the finish. It is hard, and I know you worry, but you should not. Every person has made sacrifice. The war must be our victory and each of us must be ready for sacrifice, but the end must come. I cannot tell you how happy all my letters and presents from home make me. Never have I read such letters.
