### CARLETON COUNTY CASE DECIDED BY COURT OF APPEAL

In the Court of Appeal on Friday  
last at Fredericton, judgment was  
handed down in the case of Hathfield  
& Co., Ltd. vs. Wooster B. Cronkhite.  
The case was tried at the Carleton  
County Court in July last before Chief  
Justice McKewen and a jury and re-  
sulted in a verdict for the plaintiff for  
\$12,000. The court found that there was  
misdirection on the part of the learned  
Chief Justice on the question of dam-  
ages and ordered the damages reduced  
to \$825 or a new trial, whichever the  
plaintiff would accept, with costs of  
appeal to the defendant. R. P. Hartley  
argued the case before the Court of  
Appeal for the defendant and G. J.  
Jones for the plaintiff.
