FRASERS PLAN FOR EXTENSIVE DEVELOPMENTS

It is quite evident from recent developments that Fraser Companies Limited, lumber and pulp and paper operators, have in course of working out plans of development calculated to make the province of New Brunswick a big factor in Canadian pulp and paper production.

Plans have been announced involving a re-organization on the large scale of the Fraser companies, and having as their aim the establishment of a large new power plant at Tobique Narrows and the erection of a sulphite pulp and paper mill for the manufacture of newsprint.

In the meantime, in the prosecution of their plans, Fraser Companies have purchased the Dominion Pulp Mills, at Chatham (N.B.), the output of which will add 15,000 tons per annum of easy bleaching sulphite pulp to the present Fraser 35,000 ton output from their Edmundston mill, financing for which was completed just one year ago by the issue by Royal Securities Corporation of 2,000,000 of six per cent, first mortgage serial bonds.

It is understood that the purchase of the new addition of Fraser Companies plants was financed by the recent purchase by Royal Securities of the unissued balance of \$450,000 of the same bond issue. All of the bonds have been sold.

Both in variety and quantity the present output of Fraser Companies is extensive enough to form a broad foundation for new developments. The company's ten saw mills in the eastern portion of Quebec province, and in New Brunswick, now produces yearly 100,000,000 feet of lumber, 135,000,000 shingles and 50,000,000 laths. In addition to this lumber output, the company already produces 35,000 tons of bleached sulphite pulp, to which must be added the new output of 15,000 tons easy bleaching sulphite pulp of the Dominion Pulp Mills, at Chatham.

It is expected that the recent developments will mark the beginning of an extensive expansion on the part of the Fraser Companies.



