SPIRITUALISM

The subject of Spiritualism was discussed at the regular meeting of the Miramichi Ministerial Association held last Tuesday afternoon in Newcastle.

Rev. L. H. MacLean of Newcastle and Rev. J. H. A. Anderson of Chatham, read interesting papers and the meeting was very enthusiastic throughout.

It was argued (1) That the name Spiritualism was suggestive, as the subject had to do with man's spirit.

(2) That Spiritualism had always been manifest in the world, and both Testaments proved this fact.

(3) What happened once, might and no doubt would occur again. Spirits would visit this world again but only in accordance with laws of their nature, only by means of proper conductors, and only as the way was prepared for them. It was a good sign of the times that the people of thought and intelligence of today were interested in the subject and trying to discover the conductors and to prepare the way.

Sir Oliver Lodge, a thinker and scientist of world wide reputation, and Mr. A. J. Balfour, one of the greatest philosophers of the day, were both giving this matter their thought and attention, and it was not right for any of us to treat lightly the conclusions arrived at by men such as these.

It was the unanimous opinion of all the clergy present that the subject was worth while and should not be ignored by any one.
